Our own Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton tells a story about something that happened when she was a pastor serving a congregation, and I'm delighted to retell it.

One Sunday, the ushers were solemnly taking up the collection as usual, and the people were glumly doing their duty and putting their offerings in the plate as usual.

A little girl in the assembly, seeing what was going on, nudged her dad and pleaded (and pleaded and pleaded) until he gave in and dug into his wallet and handed her a bill so she could make an offering, too.

Wait for me! Here's mine!

The little girl ran up the aisle after the ushers, waving the bill in the air, calling, "Wait for me, wait for me! Here's mine! I want to put some in!" And as she dropped the money in the plate, she beamed with joy and then danced her way back to her dad's side.

Later, at coffee hour, Bishop Eaton–I mean, Pastor Eaton–was chatting with a parishioner and said, "Wasn't that little girl beautiful? It would be so wonderful if everyone could give as joyfully."

And the parishioner said, "Well, it's easy for her—it's not her money!"

And Pastor Eaton replied: "No." And she paused—a pregnant pause—and then went on, "It's her father's."

Message about giving

If you've ever met Bishop Eaton, you can envision the twinkle in her eye as she tells that story. Cute as the story is, it carries a real theological message about giving.

In the parish where I grew up, we sang a little acclamation as the ushers carried our offerings up the aisle every Sunday: "All things come of thee, O

ELCA presiding bishop's pastoral message on situation in Gaza

Like so many here in our country and around the world, I am appalled and saddened by yesterday's escalation of Israeli military action against protestors in Gaza. Many reports indicate that at least 60 Palestinians, including six children, have died and more than 2,000 have been injured as a result of Israel's disproportionate use of force. Our church will support a planned medical mission from The Lutheran World Federation's Augusta Victoria Hospital in Jerusalem to Gaza to assist the wounded.

I join Bishop Sani-Ibrahim Azar of our partner church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL), who today said:

We mourn with the families of the dead and dying and pray for the recovery of the injured. We believe that violent actions against the Palestinian civilians will hinder the potential for peace and reconciliation efforts between Israel and Palestine and will only lead to more violence and bloodshed.

I endorse his call "upon the Israeli government to show restraint and to pursue negotiations with Palestinian leaders rather than choosing violent action against unarmed protestors."

Yesterday's events should also be seen in the context of the opening of the U.S. Embassy in Jerusalem. When that decision was announced late last year, I said:

This unilateral action would not support the cause of peace and a twostate solution but rather would unnecessarily create further tensions and possible violence that would make efforts to bring them back together for talks much more difficult.

I also support the ELCJHL's long-standing position, affirmed by Bishop Azar today, that "any final status agreement will include Jerusalem as a shared city for Jews, Christians and Muslims with free access to holy sites for all and that it must serve as capital of both Palestine and Israel."

Always, but especially in this time of deep distress, I urge us all to join his call to "continue to pray, advocate and faithfully work towards a peaceful and just solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict."

Almost 80 percent of all the world's food is produced on small farms, where family members often work side by side. Growing food is just one of the many ways farmers care for God's creation and help share God's gifts with others so that all are fed. Yet half of the world's 815 million undernourished people live on farms themselves. Without access to adequate resources and training, farming families can often go hungry. And when the unexpected happens – drought, flooding, conflict and beyond – fewer farmers can make it through. Access to livestock, seeds, tools and training can change everything. Parents can earn income to save, kids can go to school, and their families can stay safe and secure in their homes. With support from ELCA World Hunger, communities around the world are working together to end hunger – for good.

ELCA World Hunger's Global Farm Challenge is a yearlong, youth driven fundraising challenge to support the agriculturerelated programs of ELCA World Hunger, our church's ministry to end hunger and poverty. Many youth and youth groups will raise funds ahead of the 2018 ELCA Youth Gathering in June, and many will bring their offerings to the Gathering. At the Interactive Learning Space in the NRG Center, youth and adults will have the chance to participate in an unforgettable experience designed to immerse them in what it's like to be a smallholder farmer around the world. The goal of ELCA World Hunger's Global Farm Challenge is to raise \$500,000 or more in 2018 to equip communities around the world and in the United States with livestock, seeds, tools, training and other agriculturerelated activities to turn a hungry season into a hopeful season. And now, thanks to generous friends of the ELCA, all gifts toward the Global Farm Challenge will be matched - dollar for dollar - up to \$515,000, so together we can raise more than \$1 million to create healthier families, stronger economies and a future filled with hope.



A Message from Bishop Daniel G. Beaudoin

In one of my past e-mail blasts, I mentioned praying the "Jesus Prayer" during my long-distance runs. "Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me!" This prayer has its Biblical roots in Mark 10:44-48, the Healing of Blind Bartimaeus. Jesus and His disciples are leaving Jericho, when a blind beggar, named Bartimaeus, begins to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Jesus hears the cry of the blind man and grants Bartimaeus the mercy of healing. Blind eyes now see! "Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me!"

Exactly when the Jesus Prayer moved from the pages of Scripture to the petition of our hearts is unknown. Tradition tells us that the Jesus Prayer was used extensively in the monasteries of the Eastern (Orthodox) Church. In the late 1800's, an unknown Russian monk wrote a book called The Way of the Pilgrim. It's a great story about a monk who travels across Russia searching for a way to live out St. Paul's challenge to "Pray without ceasing" (1 Thessalonians 5:17). He travels to churches and monasteries. He meets with priests and abbots, but no one can help him. Finally, his journey takes him to one of the startsi, a wise and experienced spiritual elder. The elder introduces the pilgrim to the Jesus Prayer, and teaches him how to pray it, over, and over, and over, as a spiritual mantra. "Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me!"

The old starts instructs the inquisitive pilgrim, "Sit down alone and in silence. Lower your head, shut your eyes, breathe in and out gently, and imagine yourself looking into your own heart. Carry your mind, that is, your thoughts, from your head to your heart. As you breathe out, say "Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me." Say it moving your lips gently, or simply say it in your mind. Try to put all other thoughts aside. Be calm, be patient, and repeat the process very frequently."

Dear Friends in Christ, give the Jesus Prayer a try. Set the timer on your phone for 3 minutes. As the prayer becomes more familiar you can add more time. Find a comfortable place to sit or kneel at home, at work, or in church. Slowly repeat in your mind and silently on your lips, "Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me!" Pray this simple prayer again and again. Allow the prayer to flow from your mind and lips to your heart (this will take practice, but it will eventually happen). Thoughts and distractions will come. That's ok. Just go back to repeating the prayer. "Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me!" The more you practice this prayer, the less frequent the distractions will be. When your time is up, give thanks to God, and get on with your day.

They collect left over yarn or crocheted rectangles to join together to make baby and adult blankets for those in need.

Yarn, of any color, may be placed in the basket in the Narthex.

Rectangles, of any color, should be 7" x 9" and made from #4 weight, acrylic yarn.

A small (baby) blanket consists of 36 blocks and a larger blanket (adult size) consists of 49 blocks.

Once these beautiful blocks are crocheted together to form a blanket, they are donated to shelters or shipped to areas where there has been a flood, hurricane, fire, etc.


