A: We will be staying at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church on the Rocky Boy Indian Reservation near Box Elder, Montana. About a half hour from Havre and an hour and a half from Great Falls.

#### Q: I want to know more about the Reservation...

A: Rocky Boy's Indian Reservation provides a home for about 4,500 members of the Chippewa-Cree tribe. One story has it that the name "Rocky Boy" was derived from the name of a leader of a band of Chippewa Indians. It actually meant "Stone Child," but it was not translated correctly from Chippewa into English, and the name "Rocky Boy" evolved. The reservation is near the Canadian border, in northcentral Montana. It is graced by the Bear Paw Mountains, which provide dramatic contrast to the flat bottomland of the area.

#### Q: How are we getting there?

A: According to Google Maps, it's a 24 hour drive. I thought about looking into charting a bus, but I'm not sure how many people would want to sit on a bus for 24 hours (myself included).

#### Q: Where will we be staying?

A: The church has lodging on site, but it seems rustic. I'm thinking it will be similar to a lodge at a church camp. We are asked to bring our own bedding.

#### Q: Are there other lodging options?

A: There is space for tents and we can sleep in tee-pees if we request in advance. They also have a few RV hookups, so if someone wanted to make the drive there would be a place to park your camper.

#### Q: What type of work will we be doing?


A: According to Pastor Linda, "We always have a few on-site projects we are working on along with things we work out with tribal entities - could be painting, carpentry, doing some work in our little Thrift Store or community garden. With every group, we make a set of bunk-beds that gets delivered to a family on the reservation. Once we deliver it and set it up, it is usable that evening." Also, they will tailor the work to the skills of the group, so there will be work for everyone.

#### Q: I think I might like to go, what do I do?

A: Stop by the church, send an email, call or talk to me after worship. I will be glad to answer any questions you have. We will be scheduling a meeting after the holidays for those who are interested in talking details.

I hope that you will prayerfully consider joining us on this trip and/or joining our other serving opportunities during our Year of Service.

If you would like to submit a question for "Ask the Pastor", Biblical, theological, church related, anything you have been dying to ask a pastor, you can hand me a note, ask me after church, send an e-mail, or sneak into the church after dark and anonymously slide a sealed envelope under my office door. Thanks to **Richard Crosskill** (member of St. John), who does our lawn mowing and keeps our grounds looking beautiful.


We have contracted with **A&B Clean Team** for weekly (Friday) cleaning of the entire building.




#### Wise Men Search for Jesus

#### What's left on the 13th Day of Christmas??

Christmas comes at a descending time. The old year is coming to an end, the new year is not yet here. It is too late to accomplish goals set on the previous New Year's Day, and just enough time to realize that whatever shape or state you are in will be the shape or state in which you end the year. There is a hefty dose of "what-might-have-been."

In the Northern Hemisphere the trees are bare, fields are barren, birds have migrated, animals are hibernating, the days are short and the nights are long. The earth's colors are muted, and when there is snow the world becomes silent. Sometimes during these short days and long nights I find myself thinking about the brevity of life. This conflicts with my tendency to believe that the possibility of self-improvement and renewal is limitless: there is always another day, more time, another chance. I remember watching our first child as she slept in her cradle, thinking about the future before her and, at the same time, the reality that there would be an end. The Ash Wednesday declaration, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return," became more pointed and more poignant. The cradle-to-grave progression is our path; the inevitable decline of our strength.

"As for mortals, their days are like grass; they flourish like a flower of the field; for the wind passes over it, and it is gone, and its place knows it no more" (Psalm 103:15).

Maybe this is why the Christmas season can be so fraught. Of course, there is anticipation and celebration, but there is also pressure and stress. Perhaps we are trying to greet the Lord's birth with our best efforts (when I was a girl, Christmas preparations were not complete until the silver was polished, and that job fell to me), but desperation can creep into the urgency to get Christmas right, to hold back the night. "The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight" (ELW, 279). This is freight that Christmas can't carry when Christmas depends on us.

But Christmas also comes at an opportune time. God did not come to us that first Christmas when we were at the top of our game or when the world was perfect. Even the circumstances of Jesus' birth were a sharp reminder that all was not well – forced migration to Bethlehem, no room for the young family, born in a stall. Emmanuel – God with us – came to us and comes to us precisely at the time when our need is greatest. Our attempts to bring about perfection actually get in the way of receiving the gift. When we try to fit into an unrealistic ideal of who we ought to be instead of welcoming God into our real self, no matter how messy, then what is left on the 13th day of Christmas? Fatigue, certainly, but also the dull acceptance that life moves from cradle to grave.

On Christmas, God has reversed the cradle to grave progression. The angel announced to the shepherds:

"I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: for to you is born this day in the city of David a savior, who is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger."

Here is the new reality. Here is the truth. Our lives are not a meaningless trudge from cradle to grave, but a joyful journey – true and lasting joy – from grave to cradle. All our brokenness and death meet life and healing and hope in the child in the manger. His cradle defeats the grave. We are loved. We are alive. Now we are free to greet this holy season.

Merry Christmas, dear church.

## Northwestern Ohio Synod Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

#### 2019 Year of Scripture Sneak Peek

2019 will be the Year of Scripture in the Northwestern Ohio Synod. What follows is a quick outline of Coming Attractions.

The Year of Scripture will have a 3-fold focus:

- 1. Bible Reading as a daily discipline and habit
- 2. Bible Reflection to help us become fluent in the language of sacred scripture
- 3. Bible Study: to lead us to discover the depths of who God is and the breadth of what God does.

Our Year of Scripture Memory Verse is Psalm 119:105 "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path".

A Year of Scripture Bible Study will be available on the Synod Website on January 1, 2019. This year's 6-session study will focus on the Sermon on the Mount from Matthew 5-7. Learn how Jesus reads and reflects on Scripture. Hear Jesus' call that as disciples we are to be hearers and doers of God's Word. This 6-session Sermon on the Mount Bible study will make a great Lenten Study / Sermon Series

#### Dear Friends in Christ,

"Because of all this we make a firm agreement in writing, and on that sealed document are inscribed the names of our officials... The rest of the people, the priests, the Levites, the gatekeepers, the singers, the temple servants, and all who have separated themselves from the peoples of the lands to adhere to the law of God, their wives, their sons, their daughters, all who have knowledge and understanding, join with their kin, their nobles, and enter into a curse and an oath to walk in God's law, which was given by Moses the servant of God, and to observe and do all the commandments of the Lord our Lord and his ordinances and his statutes"

(Nehemiah 9:38 & 10:28-29)

After God's people prayed a powerful prayer of confession (Nehemiah 9), they took a sacred oath (10:29), and signed their names to a document. In this document they promised to fully observe the commandments, ordinances, and statutes of God. They promised to put first things first. They promised to prioritize. They promised to live their lives by the order of sacred importance.

As a follower of Jesus, what would you say your 5 top priorities are? Does the time, energy, and resources you expend in these areas truly reflect their priority?

As a parish of Jesus followers, what would you say your 5 top priorities are? Once again, does the time, energy, and resources you expend in these areas truly reflect their priority?

As we look back on the past year, many of our parishes will be performing financial audits. Looking back over the books to confirm that investments, income, and expenses have been properly scrutinized and satisfactorily attested. Some (including the Northwestern Ohio Synod) will make use of a professional outside auditor to do this important financial work.

I wonder what a priority audit would look like? How did we live out our God given mission and vision? How did we share our agreed upon values? How did we achieve or fail to achieve our annual goals? And if you're really brave and want to take this to the next level, reach out to an "outside auditing firm". Ask the folks living in your neighborhood. Ask the village police officer? Ask the middle school principal. Ask the local postmaster? Are we whom we claim to be? And are we becoming whom God longs for us to be?

Toward the end of the Book of Nehemiah, God's people promised to fully observe the commandments, ordinances, and statutes of God. They promised to put first things first. They promised to prioritize. They promised to live their lives by the order of sacred importance. So, how are we doing?

My prayer is that the followers of Jesus in the Northwestern Ohio Synod become a people of purpose, passion, and priority.


