### Ask the Pastor

### "Did Jesus make mistakes?"

This was asked by one of our younger members. The actual the question was, "Was Jesus perfect?" In the case of Jesus, I think of "perfect" to mean "without sin", but I think the issue of "making mistakes" was at the heart of this question; so I'm going to answer both questions...

First I want to affirm that scripture is pretty clear that Jesus was without sin. The author of Hebrews, writing about Jesus saying, "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin." (Hebrews 4:15) Peter writes in metaphor about Jesus's saving blood, "like that of a lamb without defect or blemish" (1 Peter 1:18). There is similar imagery throughout Revelation as well. (However, there are other passages such as Jesus in Matthew calling us to be perfect as our heavenly Father is perfect (Matthew 5:48), so maybe "perfect" is something deeper than being sinless.)

Anyway, to address what I perceive to be the "heart" of the question, "Did Jesus make mistakes?" I think the answer is, "yes, he surly did."

That may sound surprising, but do we really think that when Jesus was a little kid, he never spilled his Kool-Aid on the kitchen table? That he never made a mistake on his math homework? Or he always measured exactly right on a construction project? He probably did all those things and dozens of other silly mistakes we all make.

I think it's important to note there is a big difference between committing a sin and making a mistake. We believe Jesus was fully human, therefore Jesus made mistakes; just like us.

I like the proverb, I don't know the source; "Your best teacher is your last mistake." Making mistakes is part of the learning process... if we are mature enough to learn the lessons they teach. After the incident of boy Jesus being left in the temple, Luke tells us "Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man" (Luke 2:52). I take that to mean, he learned. There were things Jesus didn't know. He 'grew in wisdom and stature' by learning things from his parents, leaning things from his teachers, learning things from the scholars in the temple, and anywhere else he could learn. And just like us, part of the learning process is making mistakes.

The take-away for us is, when we make mistakes, or have to admit that we were wrong, or not listening, or don't understand, or don't know the answer, we are not admitting weakness. We are celebrating our humanity. Like Jesus, when we are open to being wrong, we are on the path to learning.







### Nehemiah 10

A list of the people who sign the covenant is given. Further laws to be obeyed: no selling of wares on the Sabbath, cancellation of debts every seven years, tithes and regulations concerning offerings and temple administration.

### Week of November 12

### Nehemiah 11

A tenth of the people live in Jerusalem, and the rest in other cities. The distribution of people is decided by lot. Lists of people who stayed in Jerusalem, and a list of other towns and villages in Judah are given.

### Week of November 19

### Nehemiah 12

Records of priests, Levites and temple duties is given. The Jerusalem wall is dedicated with marching, music and sacrifice. People contribute to the temple.

### Week of November 26

### Nehemiah 13

The law is read. Nehemiah journeys back to Persia; when he returns to Jerusalem, he is horrified to discover that Eliashib, the priest charged with managing the storerooms of the temple, had rented a room out in the temple courts to Tobiah. Tobiah is expelled. Nehemiah also realized that the Levites have not been granted their due portions, and that business is being conducted on the Sabbath. Nehemiah cleanses Judean life from everything pagan, and asks God to remember him.

### **December**

When we finish with Nehemiah, we will begin reading Paul's "Pastoral Letters" (1 Timothy, 2 Timothy, and Titus). Written to his coworkers in the gospel, Paul addresses these letters to Timothy and Titus to guide them in matters concerning the care of the church. These are likely churches Paul founded and these two men have stayed on to minister to. These are called "Pastoral Letters" because of their strong bearing on the life of the church, which is the household of God





# From the Presiding Bishop

So, Now What??

This month marks the 501st anniversary of the <u>Reformation</u>. Last year it was all Reformation all the time. It was our year!

News, media and the public paid attention. Hundreds of Reformation-themed events took place. Documentaries were produced and joyful liturgies with our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters were held. I have lost track of the number of "Flat Luther" photos that were taken. We walked with a spring in our step. We read <a href="Martin Luther's Small Cate-chism">Martin Luther's Small Cate-chism</a> together. Even Lutherans in parts of the U.S. where Lutherans are not dense were noticed!

But the spotlight has dimmed, the public and the media have turned their eye to other things. Reformation 500 swag has taken up residence in the backs of closets and the bottoms of file drawers. And, I'd wager, our Small Catechisms sit alone and unopened on shelves and apps. This really is Oct. 32.

But, dear church, now is the time for us to refocus our attention on the gospel of our freedom, forgiveness and reconciliation given to us through God's indescribable act of love in the death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ. Take out your Small Catechism and take a fresh look at Luther's clear and concise exposition of the faith.

To start, turn to Luther's explanation of the second article of the Apostles' Creed. In beautifully spare language, he lays out the truth about God and human nature: "I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father in eternity, and also a true human being, born of the virgin Mary, is my Lord."

Two things jump out—the God of all creation, infinite and omnipotent, set aside all of that to become finite and helpless as the Christ child and the broken one on the cross, and this Jesus is Lord. There are many things that claim our attention and allegiance, but none of these can save us and none of these is Lord.

Luther continues: "He has redeemed me, a lost and condemned human being." He had a conservative and realistic assessment of humankind. Yes, we affirm with the psalmist that we are "fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14), but it is also clear that we are seriously and terminally broken. We are a rebellious lot constantly rising up against God's good and gracious will and trying to set ourselves up as savior. This never ends well. And while there is pain in acknowledging that we are sinful, there is also freedom in confessing that truth.

Here's the thing: we have to get past a kind of Billy Joel theology in which God sings "I Like You Just the Way You Are" to the realization that God does not like us just the way we are and in infinite love has done something about it. In Christ, Luther wrote, God has "purchased and freed me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver but with his holy, precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death."

Here is pure grace. It is God's action, not ours. We don't have to—in fact, we cannot—do anything to save ourselves or the world. God has done it.

So now what? So now we live, really live, in freedom and in service. Luther wrote: "He has done all this in order that I may belong to him, live under him in his kingdom, and serve him in eternal righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as he is risen from the dead and lives and rules eternally."

This is what the world needs to see in us and hear from us—not a vindictive, capricious god who must be appeased, nor a purveyor of therapeutic moralism, but an all-powerful God who comes to us in humble human form to set us free from our murderous rebellion so we may be whole, holy and wholly devoted to joyful service.

This is most certainly true.

Dear Friends in Christ,

"When the seventh month came-the people of Israel being settled in their towns- all the people gathered together into the square before the Water Gate. They told the scribe Ezra to bring the book of the law of Moses, which the Lord had given to Israel. Accordingly, the priest Ezra brought the law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could hear with understanding. This was on the first day of the seventh month" (Nehemiah 8:1-2).

Antoine de Saint-Exupéry was a beloved French author who wrote the children's book, Le Petit Prince (The Little Prince). He was also a pilot in the Free French Airforce and was shot down and killed by the Nazis while on a reconnaissance mission in 1944. From 1941-1943, Antoine and his wife lived in New York, where he wrote books and spoke passionately about the need for the United States to enter the war. He was a great speaker who knew how to cast a vision. In his book, The Wisdom of the Sands, he writes this, "If you want to build a ship, don't summon people to buy wood, prepare tools, distribute jobs, and organize the work; rather teach them to yearn for the wide, open sea." Antoine de Saint-Exupéry reminds us to ground the people God has called you to lead in a purpose that is bigger than themselves.

Nehemiah had a clear God given purpose... to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem. Though construction was not his main purpose. His main purpose was to rebuild God's people into a community of faith. Nehemiah begins this rebuilding effort by enlisting the help of the scribe Ezra. Ezra turns to Scripture and begins to build God's people through the hearing of God's Word. And when you think about it, isn't that where re-building and re-forming always begins for God's people?

Martin Luther's reforming movement was born out of a grounding in God's Word, not to mention the work of Huss, Savonarola, and Calvin. The Wesley brothers, John and Charles, helped usher in a "Great Awakening" in England through preaching and hymnody. Preaching and hymnody that were deeply grounded in God's Word.

This year is the Year of Prayer. Next year is the Year of Scripture. I invite you to learn how you and your parish may be transformed by the gift and power of God's Word.
