From the Pastor....

"Train yourself in godliness, for, while physical training is of some value, godliness is valuable in every way, holding promise for both the present life and the life to
 come." (1 Timothy 4:7b-8)

St. John

4 I joined the 100 mile club at the YMCA. The goal is to swim 100 miles by the end of the year. You don't really get anything for being in the club (other than a t-shirt 5 that I had to pay for) but it is a motivational thing for me; it helps me to be working toward a goal. I do my best to swim at least a mile (33 laps) a couple times a 6 week. Sometimes I don't make it two miles, sometimes I am able to do more. It 7 all depends on how busy the week ends up being. I also stay away from fast food and try not to eat anything that is fried. I haven't been able to beat my addiction 8 to chips and salsa, but burgers and fries are now a rare treat instead of a weekly 9 meal. I do these things to have a moderately healthier lifestyle. I would certainly not call my time in the pool "physical training." People who are in physical train-10 ing for a race or a sport exercise every day; often multiple times a day. They have specific exercises and a specific diet that will help their bodies be in peek physical 11 condition. True physical training takes a commitment. It's hard work. 12

But Paul isn't writing advice on an exercise routine for Timothy. He is making a 13 comparison of physical training to spiritual training. We sometimes like to believe that "spirituality" is simply the sense I have of being in God's presence, being 14 surrounded with God's love, sensing a transcendent dimension in the affairs of 15 everyday life. It comes as a shock for some to be told that spirituality is something we have to work at; not to mention the idea that it will take the same kind 16 of hard work as going into training for athletics. Yet that is exactly what Paul is saying. Christians need to train in godliness, just as much as an athlete needs to 17 train physically. We are not to sit back and wait for spirituality to somehow hap-18 pen to us, we are called to work to make ourselves more spiritually fit. That is part of the role of our Faith Practices – exercises to keep us spiritually fit. We 19 grow spiritually when we do, and keep doing, the actions of a disciple – praying, worshiping, reading scripture, serving, inviting, giving, and encouraging one an-20 other. Such spiritual training will help us become the kind of person who reflects 21 God's image, the kind of person who lives by faith, the kind of person who is truly able to live life in this world and whose life gives a glimpse of the world to come. 22



"Justice for women" matters because through God's grace we are called to tend to women and girls and anyone who is gendermarginalized as our neighbors. The ELCA also recognizes that tending to our neighbors includes not only immediate needs, such as food, shelter and safety, but also changes in social and religious ideas and structures. **What can you do?**

ELCA presiding bishop, faith leaders issue statement

on family separation

CHICAGO (June 7, 2018) – The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has convened ELCA ecumenical and inter-religious partners in a statement addressing concerns over a recent U.S. government policy calling for more stringent enforcement of federal immigration laws. The policy will most likely result in an increase in family separations.

The letter follows:

Recently, the Administration announced that it will begin separating families and criminally prosecuting all people who enter the U.S. without previous authorization. As religious leaders representing diverse faith perspectives, united in our concern for the wellbeing of vulnerable migrants who cross our borders fleeing from danger and threats to their lives, we are deeply disappointed and pained to hear this news.

We affirm the family as a foundational societal structure to support human community and understand the household as an estate blessed by God. The security of the family provides critical mental, physical and emotional support to the development and wellbeing of children. Our congregations and agencies serve many migrant families that have recently arrived in the United States. Leaving their communities is often the only option they have to provide safety for their children and protect them from harm. Tearing children away from parents who have made a dangerous journey to provide a safe and sufficient life for them is unnecessarily cruel and detrimental to the well-being of parents and children.

As we continue to serve and love our neighbor, we pray for the children and families that will suffer due to this policy and urge the Administration to stop their policy of separating families.

A Message from Bishop Daniel G. Beaudoin

Dear Friends in Christ,

"Then the king said to me, "What do you request?" So, I prayed to the God of heaven. Then I said to the king, "If it pleases the king, and if your servant has found favor with you, I ask that you send me to Judah, to the city of my ancestors' graves, so that I may rebuild it." The king said to me (the queen also was sitting beside him), "How long will you be gone, and when will you return?" So, it pleased the king to send me, and I set him a date" (Nehemiah 2:4-6).

In Nehemiah chapter 2, King Artaxerxes grants Nehemiah permission to travel to Jerusalem to rebuild the city walls. Notice two things in the passage above:

- 1. Nehemiah prays a prayer.
- 2. Nehemiah puts forth a plan.

When we first meet Nehemiah in chapter 1:1, it is during the month of Chislev. When Nehemiah appears before King Artaxerxes in chapter 2:1, it is the month of Nisan... four months later. So, what is Nehemiah doing for four months? Nehemiah is praying and planning.

Nehemiah points us to an important truth about leadership: in addition to a season of prayer there must also be a season of preparation. God honors a plan, and in four months' time Nehemiah prayerfully developed a plan. Great leaders are both "pray-ers" and planners. Great leaders seek God's will and then do the necessary homework.

I remember attending a Long-Range Team meeting a few years back. We had an assortment of ideas, but nothing was coming together. As I walked out to the car, the chairperson of the team, a man who had built a multi-million-dollar business from the ground up asked me, "So, what's your plan pastor? Where are you leading us?" I confessed, "I really don't know." He looked me in the eye and said, "You're our leader and we'll follow you, but you need to know where we're going." Those words were hard to hear, but I needed to hear them.

There is no substitute for the discipline of daily prayer and there is no substitute for a well thought out plan. So, tell me dear leader, how is your discipline of daily prayer and how are you coming with your God given plan?




CAN YOU HELP AT THE CHICKEN BBQ?






