- ...after the door has slammed shut—for the very last time.
- ...after the phone call you'd always hoped you'd never get.
- ...after you realize the hands on the gold watch you received at your retirement party move more slowly than you ever imagined.
- ...after the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home."
- .after the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.
  ...after the baby has arrived, putting more demands on you than you ever dreamed possible.
  - ...after you find the pink slip inserted with what is now your final paycheck.
    ...after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but
    you still need to talk it out.

# Donald L. Ruthsatz, Sr. December 27, 1922—July 15, 2019



Donald L. Ruthsatz, 96, of Williston, Ohio, died Monday, July 15, 2019, at the Genoa Retirement Village in Genoa, Ohio. Don was born in Sandusky, Ohio, on December 27, 1922, the son of Rudolph R. and Pearl M. (Miller) Ruthsatz. He married Nancy M. Slater on June 22, 1942, in Frenchburg, KY, and she preceded him in death on January 9, 2003.

#### Don was the Patriarch of St. John Williston since April, 2015

Don was a meter engineer for Columbia Gas of Ohio for 36 years, retiring in 1985. He served in the U.S. Army Infantry during WWII with stations in Central Europe, Normandy, Northern France and Rhineland. Don was very active in the Masonic Order and was a member and Past Master of the Genoa Masonic Lodge F. &A.M. #433, Genoa Council #138, Oak Harbor Chapter #162 member and former High Priest, member of the St. Omer Commandery of Toledo #059, Scottish Rite-Valley of Toledo, Zenobia Temple and the Zenobia Jeepster Unit. He was also a member of Genoa American Legion Post #324 and St. John Lutheran Church in Williston, Ohio.

Survivors include his son, Donald L. Ruthsatz, Jr. of Wisconsin, five grandchildren, four great grandchildren and step sister, Iverna (James) Westfall. He was preceded in death by his parents, wife, son, John Ruthsatz, step father, Robert Burger, half brother, Harold E. Burger and step sister, Sylvia Mewmaw.

Services were held on July 20 at St. John.

#### **Handy Tips!**

#### Wine-Stained Communion Napkins

For those in the congregation who are so gracious to setup and take down communion each week, it might be good to know that if there are wine-stained napkins it's best to treat them immediately.

When the napkins have wine stains the sooner they're removed the better chance of getting the stain out.

Good ways to remove the wine stain --

1) Mix one tablespoon of Dawn dishwashing detergent and a tablespoon of white vinegar; add 2 cups of hot water (not boiling) from the spigot. Let soak for 15 or 20 minutes.

Launder immediately.

OR

2) Place the napkin over a small bowl and pour boiling water through it.

Either way will remove the stains. Thanks!



Proverbs comes from a section of the Old Testament called Wisdom Literature. It is a collection of sayings written to uncover something true about the nature of reality in a way that makes the reader or listener wiser. As we read through these sayings, we should be aware that in the Bible, wisdom is rarely presented as a single decision, belief, or rule, but rather as a "way" or "path". Those pursuing wisdom must continually seek the path amid the twists and turns of life. We should also note that Wisdom is situational. It isn't just about knowing what to say; it's about knowing when to say it. That is why we will often find two Proverbs next to each other that seem contradictory. Wisdom is not just about knowing what is true; it's about knowing when it's true. As one commentator succinctly put it, "You reap what you sow — except when you don't."

This might be a difficult book of the Bible to come up with questions for, but it should be a good one for us to read. We will continue with our 'one chapter per week' reading plan as follows: for the week starting...



# World Council of Churches' Conference on World Mission and Evangelism Moving in the Spirit: Called to Transforming Discipleship The Arusha Call to Discipleship

The World Council of Churches' Conference on World Mission and Evangelism met in Arusha, Tanzania, from 8-13 March 2018. More than one thousand participants—all of whom are engaged in mission and evangelism—gathered from many different Christian traditions and from every part of the world.

We joyfully celebrated the life-giving movement of the Spirit of God in our time, drawing particular inspiration from African contexts and spiritualties. Through Bible study, common prayer and worship, and by sharing our stories together, we were encouraged to be witnesses to the reign of God that has come to us through the life, crucifixion, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Despite some glimmers of hope, we had to reckon with death -dealing forces that are shaking the world order and inflicting suffering on many. We observed the shocking accumulation of wealth due to one global financial system, which enriches few and impoverishes many (Isaiah 5:8). This is at the root of many of today's wars, conflicts, ecological devastation, and suffering (1Timothy 6:10). This global imperial system has made the financial market one of the idols of our time. It has also strengthened cultures of domination and discrimination that continue to marginalize and exclude millions, forcing some among us into conditions of vulnerability and exploitation. We are mindful that people on the margins bear the heaviest burden.

These issues are not new for 2018, but the Holy Spirit continues to move at this time, and urgently calls us as Christian communities to respond with personal and communal conversion, and a transforming discipleship.

Discipleship is both a gift and a calling to be active collaborators with God for the transforming of the world (1Thessalonians 3:2). In what the church's early theologians called "theosis" or deification, we share God's grace by sharing God's mission. This journey of discipleship leads us to share and live out God's love in Jesus Christ by seeking justice and peace in ways that are different from the world (John 14:27). Thus, we are responding to Jesus' call to follow him from the margins of our world (Luke 4:16-19).

### As disciples of Jesus Christ, both individually and collectively:

**We are called** by our baptism to transforming discipleship: a Christ-connected way of life in a world where many face despair, rejection, loneliness, and worthlessness.

**We are called** to worship the one Triune God—the God of justice, love, and grace—at a time when many worship the false god of the market system (Luke 16:13).

We are called to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ—the fullness of life, the repentance and forgiveness of sin, and the promise of eternal life—in word and deed, in a violent world where many are sacrificed to the idols of death (Jeremiah 32:35) and where many have not yet heard the gospel.

**We are called** to joyfully engage in the ways of the Holy Spirit, who empowers people from the margins with agency, in the search for justice and dignity (Acts 1:8; 4:31).

We are called to discern the word of God in a world that communicates many contradictory, false, and confusing messages.

**We are called** to care for God's creation, and to be in solidarity with nations severely affected by climate change in the face of a ruthless human-centered exploitation of the environment for consumerism and greed.

We are called as disciples to belong together in just and inclusive communities, in our quest for unity and on our ecumenical journey, in a world that is based upon marginalization and exclusion.

**We are called** to be faithful witnesses of God's transforming love in dialogue with people of other faiths in a world where the politicization of religious identities often causes conflict.

**We are called** to be formed as servant leaders who demonstrate the way of Christ in a world that privileges power, wealth, and the culture of money (Luke 22:25-27).

**We are called** to break down walls and seek justice with people who are dispossessed and displaced from their lands—including migrants, refugees and asylum seekers—and to resist new frontiers and borders that separate and kill (Isaiah 58:6-8).

**We are called** to follow the way of the cross, which challenges elitism, privilege, personal and structural power (Luke 9:23).

**We are called** to live in the light of the resurrection, which offers hope-filled possibilities for transformation.

#### This is a call to transforming discipleship.

This is not a call that we can answer in our own strength, so the call becomes, in the end, a call to prayer:

Loving God, we thank you for the gift of life in all its diversity and beauty. Lord Jesus Christ, crucified and risen, we praise you that you came to find the lost, to free the oppressed, to heal the sick, and to convert the self-centered.  Time, like an ever-rolling stream, bears all our years away; they fly forgotten, as a dream dies at the op'ning day.
 Our God, our Help in ages past, our hope for years to come, still be our Guide while troubles last, and our eternal home!

Bishop Beaudoin wants to encourage and challenge you to join with the rest of the Northwestern Ohio Synod and read through the entire Bible in One Year. Back in 2004 and 2012, the parishes he was serving read through the Bible in One Year as a community spiritual practice. Scripture is meant to be read in community, so please don't do this alone.
