Ask the Pastor

What is our next Faith Practice Reading?

Starting in April, we will be reading the book of Hebrews. The book of the Bible we call "Hebrews" was actually a letter written primarily to Jewish Christians. The recipients were likely Jewish believers in Jesus Christ who were facing various challenges, including persecution and the temptation to revert to their familiar practices under the Mosaic Law. The author endeavors to strengthen their faith, encourage perseverance, and provide a robust theological foundation for understanding the significance of Jesus Christ in relation to the Old Testament scriptures

and the covenantal traditions of Judaism. The letter is filled with references to the Old Testament, including the use of Hebrew scripture and the mentioning of key figures and events from Jewish history. This suggests that the audience was well-acquainted with the Old Testament and the customs associated with Judaism. The author aims to demonstrate the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies and types in Jesus Christ, emphasizing that he is the ultimate and superior High Priest, the perfect sacrifice, and the mediator of a new and superior covenant.



Hebrews can be divided into two main sections. The first section (Chapters 1-10) establishes the superiority of Jesus Christ over the angels, Moses, and the Levitical priesthood. The author emphasizes Christ's role as the final and ultimate revelation of God to humanity, surpassing the prophets and angels who played significant roles in the Old Testament. The sacrificial system of the Levitical priesthood is portrayed as insufficient, with Jesus presented as the perfect High Priest who offered himself as the ultimate and eternal sacrifice for the redemption of humanity.

The second section (Chapters 11-13) takes a more practical and persuasive tone, encouraging believers to endure in their faith amidst trials and challenges. The famous "faith chapter" (Chapter 11) highlights the exemplary faith of various Old Testament figures and serves as an inspiration for the readers to persevere. The author also provides practical exhortations for holy living, emphasizing the importance of love, hospitality, and obedience to spiritual leaders. The letter concludes with a call to fix one's eyes on Jesus, the pioneer, and perfecter of faith, and to remain steadfast in the face of difficulties.

Kathryn Mathilda Wilka, age 95 passed away Wednesday, February 21, 2024, at Peabody Retirement Home, New Manchester, IN. She was born November 19, 1928, in Graytown, Ohio and graduated from Harris Elmore High School in 1946. She married Richard H. Wilka on April 17, 1948, in Elmore and he preceded her in death on March 5, 1977.


She led an active life and had a strong work ethic. As a farmer's daughter she worked in the fields alongside her siblings. During her high school years, she worked part-time for neighbors and friends and at the former Elmore Basket Factory. After graduation she worked at different companies in Toledo. After marriage she was a homemaker for several years before returning

to work at several local companies, including the Genoa Area Schools as a secretary - over the years working at all four schools. Her last employment was at Genoa Motors retiring in 2001 at the age of 72, after 30 years of service. Retirement included volunteering at St. Charles Hospital for several years as well traveling to visit friends and family, visiting most of the 48 adjacent states and trips to Germany, Italy, Canada and Mexico. Kathryn had many other interests to fill her days - she was an excellent seamstress making clothes not only for her family but for many others including wedding and bridesmaid dresses. She loved playing cards with friends and enjoyed cooking and baking for family gatherings and friends.

She was an active participant in her church and community activities. As a longtime member of St. John Lutheran Church in Williston, Ohio, she served in a variety of positions including on the church board, The Women of the Church, singing in the choir, and teaching Sunday School. Kathryn was a strong advocate for 4-H in Ottawa county serving as a 4-H leader in Allen Township for over 20 years as well as serving on various county committees and projects promoting 4-H. She was honored to be the first delegate selected from Ottawa county to attend the National 4-H Convention in Washington D.C.

Survivors include: daughter Suzanne of San Diego, CA, son Donald (Hannelore) of Warsaw, IN. granddaughters Nicole (David) Porter of Winona Lake, IN, Adrienne Miller of Noblesville, IN. grandson Eric (Meghan Buchanan) Wilka of Opelika, AL. 

April 7 – Easter 2

John 20:19 – "Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you." The peace we have in Jesus is what makes a life of good works possible. Since we know that it is Jesus who saved us, and not our works, we are now free to do good works not out of self-interest, but for the right reasons: out of thanksgiving toward God and love for our neighbors.

April 14 – Easter 3

1 John 3:2 – "Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is." This is the essence of our sanctification: becoming like our Lord. As St. John notes, this will only be completed in the Resurrection, but in the meantime, we strive toward that goal because we want to walk in the footsteps of our Lord. By His grace we share His destiny in eternal life, and therefore we desire to share His life of service now.

April 21 – Easter 4

John 10:14 – "I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me." What does it mean to know the Lord? It starts with being known by the Lord: He claims us as His own and calls us by name. Then, once we are His, we learn to know Him, and in knowing Him, we learn to imitate Him. That is how the Christian life of good works and generosity grows from the Lord's grace.

April 28 – Easter 5


John 15:2 – "Every branch of mine that does not bear fruit he takes away, and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes, that it may bear more fruit." God is interested in the fruit that we bear in good works, and He even prunes us so that we may bring forth more fruit. 

Rogation Days 2024

Dear Friends in Christ,

No Farm, No Food. This popular statement is most certainly true. In Northwestern Ohio farming is a way of life for many who sit in the pews of area Lutheran Churches. We want to honor and celebrate this important work. Without local farms and farmers our lives would be held hostage by huge corporate conglomerates that look out for their own bottom line, not the well-being of consumers.

How can the church assist farmers during the planting season? **Rogation Days** is an ancient church blessing of farms, farm animals, and farm equipment, around the time of Ascension Day, which is 40 days after Easter. Starting in Europe during the time of the Reformation, church leaders would bless the ground, and animals that would provide the food at the fall harvest. Many of our congregations celebrate Harvest days in the fall; we should also do the same at the beginning of the cycle of planting, growing, and feeding what will produce that harvest in the fall.

We have heard from one church member, "my grandfather never planted a seed until after Ascension Day." This idea certainly comes from the European tradition of Rogation Days. While times have changed and planting is dictated by different metrics, receiving the gift of God's blessing, for the creation of food for God's people, is a metric that is timeless. The pastors of the North Central Conference would like to join together to present the first annual Rogation Days festival.

Teams of pastors and lay leaders will travel around our conference to different farms which desire to receive a blessing of fields, livestock, and equipment. We will not take too much of your valuable time. The dates for the rogation blessings will be May 6,7, and 8. Times will be determined by the interest generated.

A Time for Rest-2024

"Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy. For six days you shall labor and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son, or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore, the Lord blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it" (Exodus 20:8-11).

How do we keep the Sabbath holy? As Lutheran Christians many of us were taught through Luther's Small Catechism to keep the Sabbath holy by fearing and loving God, "...so that we do not despise preaching or His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it." According to Luther, the Sabbath was less about rest and more about attending public worship and making use of God's Word and Sacraments. Participating in public worship is important. Taking a day for rest is also important. Both practices (worship and rest) are sacred and draw us deeper into a relationship with the living God. We need to worship, and we need to rest.

In Exodus, the keeping of Sabbath is directly tied to work. "For six days you shall labor and do your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the Lord your God, and you shall not do any work." God's people are called to a seventh day of rest, as God rested from creation on the seventh day. And not only did God rest, but God also "blessed the Sabbath Day and consecrated it." God made the seventh day holy, and we keep the Sabbath holy through the spiritual practice of rest.

For thousands of years God's people have put God's gift of Sabbath rest into practice. And in this Year of Rest, I'm going to give it a try, or at least "fail forward" in my attempt to keep the Sabbath holy. "Failing forward" is a favorite phrase of mine. When you tinker with a new endeavor, you don't always succeed the first time. Failing forward is learning from your failure, adapting your approach, and trying it again, and again, and again. Tinker and try long enough and you will learn to master the new practice.
