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Ask the Pastor

"This is not a question and not necessarily 'religious' in nature; except that churches, religious organizations, and pastors tend to be targeted. This is a scam I have experienced and one other church members have as well..."

A couple years ago I received an email from Bishop Beaudoin asking if I could do him a favor. Of course I said, "yes". Daniel's a good guy and I consider him a friend, so I was glad to help him out. He asked if I would buy him some gift cards. He said he was out of the country and couldn't make it to the store so he wanted me to buy the gift cards, send him the scratch off codes, and he would pay me back when he returned.

I had imagined a half dozen different things Bishop Beaudoin might ask me to do, but buy him gift cards was not one of them. That was the first thing that struck me as odd. I looked closer at the email and it appeared to come from the Bishop... but it still felt strange. The second "red flag" was that I knew the Bishop was going to be traveling to Africa, but he wasn't supposed to leave for another week. I thought, maybe I had the dates wrong, but I still wanted to check. So I called the synod office to confirm and discovered that the Bishop's email had been hacked. Everyone on his mailing list had been asked for gift cards, but the request did not come from him.

I've since discovered that I'm not the only one who has experienced this type of thing. It is, unfortunately, a common scam to clone or hack someone's email address and ask for gift cards. I read an article from 2018 that said the FBI reportedly receives more than 800 complains a day about this particular scam. Sadly, many people get taken advantage of because it starts innocently enough a friend needing a favor and we want to help.

I don't have a solution to the scam, but I do have some advice...

- My best advice <u>be aware</u>. Unfortunately, there are scammers out there trying to take advantage of good people. The odds are good that you will receive one of these emails or texts.
- If you get a message that seems 'odd', trust your instincts. Your pastor asking for peanut butter to be dropped off *at the church* for food bags is normal (thank you BTW), but an email from me asking for scratch off codes from the back of gift cards would be very unusual. Trust your instincts.
- Related to that, verify. Giving to friends and helping people is certainly a good thing, but take the extra steps to verify where your donation is going. Give directly to the person or organization you are trying to help when you can.
- Finally... don't immediately respond to emails or texts asking for a favor. Maybe pick up the phone first, call the person, and ask if they really need any extra help.

If you would like to submit a question for "Ask the Pastor", Biblical, theological, church related, anything you have been dying to ask a pastor, you can hand me a note, ask me after church, send an e-mail, or sneak into the church after dark and anonymously slide a sealed envelope under my office door. If I answer your question in print, I will not include your name unless you explicitly ask me to.

Corinth was a large, bustling city (located in southern Greece). Because of its location, goods and people from around the world flowed in and out of its ports. It was a center for art, philosophy and religion. It contained a number of pagan temples including large ones to Apollo and Aphrodite. The city had a reputation for vide, immorality and debauchery. Paul spent 18 months establishing a church in Corinth during his second missionary journey (described in Acts 18).

1 Corinthians (which may actually be the second letter Paul wrote to the Corinthians; the first was lost) was written around 54 AD. It was in response to reports Paul received concerning problems in the church, disputed matters, and competing factions. (The letter written *to* Paul has not survived.)

Overall, the letter calls this fractious congregation to unity, Paul reminds them their actions should be informed by love (chapters 8 and 13), and closes with an appeal to let this love be the governing power in the life of the community.

2 Corinthians is perhaps the most difficult to interpret of all Paul's letters. Scholars think it is a combination of several fragments of different letters. This makes it seem disjointed in places. It is certainly a mixed letter, containing different styles and various elements; appeals, exhortations, rebukes, threats, attacks, counterattacks, self-defense, self-praise, and irony.



Week of September 7

1 Corinthians 1

Paul greets the church, which is sanctified (set apart) in Jesus Christ, called to be saints. He makes a plea for unity – Christ is not divided. The message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

Week of September 14

1 Corinthians 2

Paul did not preach to the Corinthians with 'wisdom' or excellent speech. Faith should not be in human wisdom, but in the power of God. The wisdom of God is not the same as the wisdom of the world – if it had been, Christ would not have been crucified. God's wisdom is known only by the Holy Spirit.

Week of September 21

1 Corinthians 3

The Corinthians have a carnal mindset – they are babes in Christ, fed with milk rather than solid food. Corinthian factionalism suggests carnality. 'I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase.' Individual Christians are temples.

Week of September 28

1 Corinthians 4

We are servants and stewards of Christ. Paul is justified not by human courts, but answers only to God. Do not be puffed up with pride. 'We are weak, but you are strong!' – Paul sarcastically contrasts his own 'foolishness' with their greatness. Shall I come to you with a rod, or in love and a spirit of gentleness?

Week of October 5

1 Corinthians 5

There are accusations of sexual immorality among the Corinthians – a man with his father's wife. Paul, who is present in spirit, has judged the person who has committed this sin – he must be given over to Satan, that his flesh may be destroyed, and his spirit saved. A little sin affects everyone – a little leaven leavens the whole lump. Let us purge this leaven, for Christ, our Passover, was sacrificed for us. Paul admonishes church members to keep themselves separate from immoral people.

September Stewardship Grounded in Faith, rowing to Serve

"When each separate part works as it should, the whole body grows, and builds itself up through love." Ephesians 4:16

"There are a variety of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone.

1 Corinthians 12:5-6

Every Wednesday evening before small-grouping for missions or Bible study or "prayer meeting" we as a church family would get together for supper. The church supper committee supplied the main course—meat and potatoes, chicken and potato salad, fish and chips—and every family brought in a favorite vegetable or salad or bread and/or dessert.

After supper everyone took their dirty dishes to the kitchen, scraped plates, emptied glasses, and placed the used hardware on the counter where it was immediately removed to the grand industrial-grade dishwasher that had been given to the church several years before by the university when their kitchen equipment was upgraded. It was a well-oiled, good Baptist operation, and the dishes were steaming clean almost before everyone finished at table, and, before the kitchen committee left for prayer meeting, put away for use another day.

Except of course for the big pots and pans in which the main dishes had been cooked and served. Those monsters would not fit in the assembly-line trays of the dishwasher. The heavy -duty pots and pans had to be washed by hand in the deep double sinks.

So there she stood, sleeves rolled up about six laps, full-length cafeteria apron secured round her neck and waist, and up to her elbows in hot soapy water scrubbing and rinsing those heavy, greasy pots and pans.

She was in her seventies. She was not frail. But she was beginning to show her age. And now perspiration beaded up on her softly wrinkled forehead. And she sometimes struggled to lift that heavy stock pot or that huge baking pan.

Naturally, when I noticed her hard at work, and saw that no one else—uncharacteristically for those good folk—even offered to help her, and, perhaps, seeking to make a new-preacher good impression—I offered to help her with her heavy load.

"Miss Alma," I offered, "let me help you with those heavy pots and pans, and then," I ventured, "let's see if we can get someone else to share this job with you." I was not prepared for her strong response.

"Pastor," she said, "this here is my job! I been doin' it for years. I ain't got much education, so I can't teach a class. And I can't carry a tune in a washtub, so I can't sing in the choir. But I raised six children and now I'm helping raise twelve grandchildren. I know how to wash pots and pans! That's my talent! You just go on and help somebody who needs help. I got this job covered!"

Do I need to tell you that I never again offered to take some of the load? And I understood why no one else offered to help either—"This here is my job!"

Every Christian has some talent, ability and a spiritual gift he or she has received from God.

1 Peter 4:10 As each one has received a special gift, employ it in serving one another as good stewards of the manifold grace of God.





Jesus cried out, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me, and let the one who believes in me drink. As the scripture has said, 'Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water.'"

- John 7:37-38

If you travel to the Grand Canyon and hike along the rim in the desert you will find an interesting sign. It reads, "Stop! Drink water. You are thirsty, whether you realize it or not." It is a baffling idea to think that we may not recognize our own thirst. But we human beings know that it is very possible to be so preoccupied living, working, checking off our to-do-list, that we forget to nourish our bodies. More than once I have come home from a busy day to suddenly discover, "I am thirsty". I am not alone, 75% of Americans don't get enough water to drink each day. Three out of four of us walk around in a chronic state of dehydration and we don't even realize it.

The same can happen in our faith lives. A sign could be posted for us in the dry places cautioning, "Stop! Drink water. You are thirsty, whether you realize it or not." Sometimes I think the Holy Spirit suddenly makes us aware of our thirst for a reason. Realizing your thirst is a gift. It allows you to seek a source of abundant nourishment.

Four years ago we began Diakonia (pronounced dee-ak-on-ee'-ah) here in the Southeastern Conference. We noticed that there were lay leaders in our congregations thirsty for deeper understanding, so we gathered teachers and learners together and brought the Diakonia Program here to Northwestern Ohio. Diakonia is Greek for service. Diakonia is a call to discipleship. It gathers Christians together to grow and learn in order to more fully respond to the call to serve Christ. The curriculum consists of twelve courses, with six courses offered each academic year. Each course has five sessions that meets in three-hour increments on Tuesday nights. Each course is taught by a different rostered leader and students come from many different congregations. Weekly reading assignments and reflections are designed to relate to topic of study and stir conversation. Tuition is \$60 per course. Scholarships are also available for all those in need of assistance. Beginning this fall Diakonia will be hosted in five different congregation and online through Zoom.


