Ask the Pastor

The Finance Committee asked if I knew of any organizations or projects we could support with our end of year surplus. The following is more of a question for you than an answer...

When St. John has an end of year budget surplus (contributions have exceeded church expenses) the Church Council decides how to spend that money. This year (2019) it appears we will have a budget surplus. The exact amount, of course, will not be known until the end of the end of December. Last year (2018) income over expense monies went to the roof project. This year the Finance Committee recommends a portion of the overage to go to outreach. The Church Council would like the congregation's help in identifying good outreach/benevolent ministries that would be helped by St. John's contribution.



We will collect suggestions through the middle of January, and then comprise a list for congregation members to rank their priorities. Based on the actual amount of the surplus, the number of suggestions, the congregation's ranking, etc., the Church Council will determine the disbursement of the available funds. It is our hope that by seeking your suggestions, we will get a wider variety of project ideas and we will be able to support organizations that are important to the members of St. John. If you would like to make a recommendation or suggestion, please include...

1) the name of the organization

2) the type of ministry they do, what the money will be spent on, etc.

3) the dollar amount you are recommending, if known (for example, we once made a donation for outdoor seating at Luther Home of Mercy. We knew how much each bench would cost.)

4) your name and contact information if we need to get additional information about your suggestion.

(Please keep mind we are looking to support established ministries outside St. John Lutheran Church rather than individuals. While we certainly want to try to help individuals, that's not the type of suggestion we're are seeking for this project.)

One organization that I will be adding to the list...

Last year we served at Salem Lutheran Church at their "Just Pancakes" ministry. We took a donation from the Good Samaritan fund and they were so overjoyed; kept talking about all they could do, how many people they could feed with that money.

Therefore, my suggestion is...

Salem Lutheran Church, Toledo (Just Pancakes)

Every Saturday morning, the church serves a free, all-you-can-eat pancake breakfast to the people in community. From their website: Their pancake breakfast "is about developing

relationships with people living in our neighborhood, valuing each person regardless of background or perceived status, volunteers meeting and about having conversation with people from the community, and offering carryout breakfasts to neighbors." The money we donate will be spent to buy supplies for making pancakes.

There is no specific dollar amount for this project. Any donation would be appreciated.

I will be collecting suggestions through the middle of January and compiling a list for the February newsletter. You can send your suggestions to me through e-mail (pastorobrien@stjohnwilliston.org), written, or by filling out one of the forms outside my office door.



Thanks to **Richard Crosskill** (member of St. John), who does our lawn mowing and keeps our grounds looking beautiful.


We have contracted with **A&B Clean Team** for weekly (Friday) cleaning of the entire building.



"This letter is truly the most important piece in the New Testament. It is purest Gospel. It is well worth a Christian's while not only to memorize it word for word but also to occupy himself with it daily, as though it were the daily bread of the soul. It is impossible to read or to meditate on this letter too much or too well." (Martin Luther's Preface to the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans)

The apostle Paul wrote this letter to the Christians in Rome, probably while in the city of Corinth on his third missionary journey, around the year 57 A.D. (Acts 20:2–3). The church in Rome was comprised of Gentile believers who converted from idol worship and devoted Jews who believed Jesus was their promised Messiah. They were a diverse group of people. Problems arose when the Jews urged the Gentiles to undergo the rite of circumcision. Paul felt obligated to write, settling this argument and then fully explaining the grace of God.

The main theme of Romans can summed up in chapter 1, verses 16-17...

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel; it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who has faith, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed through faith for faith; as it is written, "The one who is righteous will live by faith."



Week of January 6

Romans 1

Christ is prophesied in the scriptures; he is of the seed of David yet also the Son of God. Paul desires to come to Rome. The gospel of Christ is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes. The just (those declared righteous) shall live by faith.

Week of January 13

Romans 2

Those who judge others are themselves condemned. God is impartial, judging those who have heard the law, and those who have not. Gentiles may by nature act according to the law, being a law unto themselves. Jews boast of the law, but the law condemns them. Circumcision of the heart, in the Spirit, is more important than circumcision in the flesh.

Week of January 20

Romans 3

The Jews have advantages – the oracles of God were committed to them. The fact that some Jews did not believe does not mean that God's faithfulness has no effect. Human unrighteousness demonstrates the righteousness of God – does this mean we can be sinful, so good may come? Certainly not! The death of Jesus satisfies the righteous judgment of God. A person is justified by faith apart from the deeds of the law. this mean the law is irrelevant?

Week of January 27

Romans 4

Abraham was not justified by works, but declared righteous through faith. Works involves earning merit, whereas grace is a freely received gift. Paul quotes Psalm 32, about sins covered, and not imputed. Abraham was counted righteous before he was circumcised; he was not counted righteous because he was circumcised.

Week of February 3

Romans 5

We access grace through faith. Christ died for the ungodly; we are saved through him, and reconciled to God. God's grace through Christ is greater than Adam's offence. By one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so also by one man's obedience many will be made righteous. The law makes sin abound, but God's grace abounds still more.

I tried to think of a clever new phrase— A slogan to inspire the next 365 days, A motto to live by this coming New Year,


And then I heard His still small voice Saying, "Consider this simple, daily choice: With each new dawn and close of day

"Don't look back, caught in regret Or dwell on the sorrow of dreams unmet; Don't stare forward <u>anchored by fear</u>,


"I am all you need. Everything. I Am. You are held secure by my strong hand. Give me this one thing—your all in all;



But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. **2 Timothy 3:14–4:5**

In 2 Timothy, St. Paul reminds Timothy to continue to lead by drawing from the strength of Sacred Scripture. It appears that Timothy has been drawing from the well of God's Word since his childhood. Reading and reflecting on Scripture is a lifelong discipline, and my hope is that you continue to dwell in God's Word long after 2019 the Year of Scripture ends. Council Meeting Highlights- December 18, 2019
