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Ask the Pastor

At the end of February our Gospel reading was from the end of Luke where Jesus talks about loving your enemies. It included this verse... "If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also" (Luke 6:29a). The question came from reflection on this reading...

Does 'turn the other cheek' mean that Christians can't defend themselves?

While we would do well to consider our use of violence, this passage actually has nothing to do with self-defense, taking a punch, or hitting someone back. This passage is dealing with insult, not a fistfight. Walter Wink, in his book from "Beyond Just War and Pacifism: Jesus' Nonviolent Way" offers this insight... (the following are Wink's words with some minor editing)

The intention of the strike here is not to injure but to humiliate, to put someone in his or her place. A backhand slap was the usual way of admonishing inferiors. Masters backhanded slaves; husbands, wives; parents, children; men, women; Romans, Jews. We have here a set of unequal relations, in each of which retaliation would be suicidal. The only normal response would be cowering submission. Part of the confusion surrounding these sayings arises from the failure to ask who Jesus' audience was. Jesus' listeners are not those who strike, but their victims – people who were subjected to this sort of indignity, forced to stifle outrage at their dehumanizing treatment by the hierarchical system of caste and class, race and gender, age and status, and as a result of imperial occupation.

Wink asks, why then does Jesus counsel these already humiliated people to turn the other cheek? Because this action robs the oppressor of the power to humiliate. The person who turns the other cheek is saying, in effect, "Try again. Your first blow failed to achieve its intended effect. I deny you the power to humiliate me. I am a human being just like you. Your status does not alter that fact. You cannot demean me."

Such a response would create enormous difficulties for the striker. Purely logistically, how would he hit the other cheek now turned to him? He cannot backhand it with his right hand (one only need try this to see the problem). If he hits with a fist, he makes the other his equal, acknowledging him as a peer. But the point of the back of the hand is to reinforce institutionalized inequality. Even if the superior orders the person flogged for such "cheeky" behavior (this is certainly no way to avoid conflict!), the point has been irrevocably made. He has been given notice that this underling is in fact a human being. In that world of honor and shaming, he has been rendered impotent to instill shame in a subordinate. He has been stripped of his power to dehumanize the other. As Gandhi taught, "The first principle of nonviolent action is that of noncooperation with everything humiliating."

Prayer Wheel designed by Rev. Melodi Hagen






Pretzels have an interesting history!

Why and how do we use ashes on Ash Wednesday?



Background: Why? Ash Wednesday is the Wednesday of the seventh week before Easter and the first day of Lent. The day is named for the practice of imposing ashes, a practice that many Lutheran congregations have found to be a very meaningful part of the Ash Wednesday liturgy. Using ashes as a sign of repentance is an ancient practice, often mentioned in the Bible (e.g., Jonah 3:5-9; Job 42:6; Jeremiah 6:26; Matthew 11:21). The early Christians adopted the use of ashes from Jewish practice as an external mark of penitence. Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human existence:

Ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19).

Ashes suggest cleansing and renewal. They were used anciently in the absence of soap. Even on Ash Wednesday, this most penitential day, we receive ashes in the form of the cross, the same symbol placed on our bodies with water in our baptism. Even in this ashen mark of death, we anticipate the new life of Easter.


Ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for it is said as we are buried into the ground or as ashes are placed in a columbarium (see "What are columbaria and memorial gardens?"). "We commit this body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 284).

Ashes are a symbol of our need to repent, confess our sins, and return to God. The liturgy for Ash Wednesday can be found in both the Evangelical Lutheran Worship (p. 251) and Leaders Desk Edition (p. 615). In the liturgy, the confession and imposition of ashes follow the sermon and hymn of the day. Following an Invitation to Lent, confession marks the beginning of a season of penitence.

The Maundy Thursday absolution is the structural response to the Ash Wednesday confession, marking off Lent as a penitential time. At the conclusion of the Ash Wednesday confession and imposition of ashes, a declaration of grace is used, coupled with a plea for mercy.

Practice: How? Those who desire to receive ashes come forward and may stand/kneel. Ashes are applied with the minister's thumb in the form of a small cross on the forehead of each person with the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Pastors and one or more assisting ministers may impose ashes, depending up the size of your assembly and local practice. Several prie-dieu (kneelers) can be stationed in appropriate places for the imposition so that people can freely move to them as they choose. Ushering is not necessary, but a printed worship folder or verbal announcements prior to the service will assist the assembly in knowing where, when and how to come forward. Silence (see "What is the role of silence in worship?) may be kept or appropriate music can accompany the imposition of ashes. Music that can be easily memorized or unaccompanied works well when other action is taking place. Also, the musical leaders need to support but not obscure the actions and words of this time.

The ELCA worship staff receives a number of similar inquires on worship-related topics from across the church. These responses should not be considered the final word on the topic, but useful guides that are to be considered in respect to local context with pastoral sensitivity. Dear Friends in Christ,

"The Lord spoke to Moses: See, I have called by name Bezalel son of Uri son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah: and I have filled him with divine spirit, with ability, intelligence, and knowledge in every kind of craft, to devise artistic designs, to work in gold, silver, and bronze, in cutting stones for setting, and in carving wood, in every kind of craft.

Moreover, I have appointed with him Oholiab son of Ahisamach, of the tribe of Dan; and I have given skill to all the skillful, so that they may make all that I have commanded you: the tent of meeting, and the ark of the covenant, and the mercy seat that is on it,



and all the furnishings of the tent, the table and its utensils, and the pure lampstand with all its utensils, and the altar of incense, and the altar of burnt offering with all its utensils, and the basin with its stand, and the finely worked vestments, the holy vestments for the priest Aaron and the vestments of his sons, for their service as priests, and the anointing oil and the fragrant incense for the holy place. They shall do just as I have commanded you." (Exodus 31:1-11).

By now, you may be getting a bit bogged down in your Daily Bible Reading by all of the instructions and details. In the last half of Exodus, we move from the narrative of God and God's people, to a bunch of commands, ordinances, and regulations. We read about the instructions for the Tabernacle, the furnishings, the priestly garments, and even a recipe for incense. In the midst of all the fine print and details, we meet 2 craftsmen, Bezalel son of Uri son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah and Oholiab son of Ahisamach, of the tribe of Dan. These 2 craftsmen are filled with God's spirit to design and craft the Tabernacle, the furnishings, and the priestly garments. Bezalel and Oholiab are given the ability to work in gold, silver, and bronze, in cutting stones for setting, and in carving wood.

While I was struggling through the instructions and details of Exodus 30-32, I was stuck by this passage about Bezalel and Oholiab. Some folks are gifted with skilled hands, and an ability to do things that many of us cannot do. They may never preach a sermon, teach a class, or tabulate a spreadsheet. But they keep our vehicles running, our houses warm, and the electricity flowing. This morning I saw a tow truck driver helping a stranded motorist. It was cold, and I prayed for both of them as I drove by. I'm glad that God singled out Bezalel and Oholiab, because sometimes we miss

the importance of folks who put in a day's labor by the work of their hands.

Think about someone you know who is gifted with their hands. Call them and thank them for the work God has called them to do, and then pray a prayer of thanksgiving with them.





Bishop Beaudoin wants to encourage and challenge you to join with the rest of the Northwestern Ohio Synod and read through the entire Bible in One Year. Back in 2004 and 2012, the parishes he was serving read through the Bible in One Year as a community spiritual practice. Scripture is meant to be read in community, so please don't do this alone.




