Ask the Pastor

Matthew 11:12 was part of my devotion reading... "From the days of John the Baptist until now, the kingdom of heaven has suffered violence, and violent people take it by force." Is the kingdom of heaven the church?

No, not necessarily. But it should be.

In Matthew's Gospel, the "kingdom of heaven" is not really a place, but the idea of God's sovereign rule over all creation, in the past, present, and future. Some Bibles will translate the phrase as the "reign of God" to emphasize the idea that it's not so much a kingdom in the clouds sort of thing, but rather God's rule over the earth. The "kingdom of heaven" is about how God wants things to be in the present world. We see this idea in the Lord's Prayer when we pray, "your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as in heaven." We are asking God to help, lead, enable us to do things God's way; do things on earth as God would want them done. In the context of passage above, I read it as Jesus' critique of how John (and the Old Testament prophets) were received. God's reign, the message of the way God wants things to be, presented by John and the prophets, was not well received. We can safely say John "suffered violence". Jesus just got done saying in verse 5, "the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, those with a skin disease are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them." That's what the reign of God looks like, but the world responds with violence and force.

So how does this idea relate to the church? One commentator wrote, "Think of the "kingdom of heaven" as the broader spiritual reality encompassing all of God's redemptive work in the world, not limited to any one institution."

That sentence is doing a lot of work... I take it to mean God's reign, the "kingdom of heaven" is bigger than just the church (small "c" church as in local congregation, and big "C" as in Church universal).

So God's reign is bigger than the institution, but... the church, as the body of Christ, can be seen as *part* of the kingdom of heaven, *part* of God's reign, especially in its role of spreading the gospel and embodying Christ's teachings. The church participates in God's redemptive work when we are doing the work of Christ... helping the blind to see, healing the sick, bringing good news to the poor, rejecting the ways of violence and force, the restoration of peace and harmony, etc.

So to my original answer... the church is a significant aspect of the kingdom but is not its entirety.

Item number three on our list of Seven Faith Practices is "read and study the Bible." Each week we, as a congregation, will be reading one chapter from a book of the Bible. Currently, we are reading from the book of Job. We will continue with our "one chapter per week" schedule. I hope you will consider joining us as we practice our faith!

The Book of Job, grouped with the "poetry and wisdom" books in the Old Testament, explores themes of suffering, faith, and the nature of God's justice. The story is set in the land of Uz and centers around Job, a blameless and upright man who fears God and shuns evil.

The narrative begins with a description of Job's prosperity and piety, yet the Adversary appears before God and argues that Job is faithful only because of his prosperity. God allows the Adversary to test Job by taking away his possessions, children, and health, but forbids him from taking Job's life. Despite his immense suffering, Job does not curse God but instead laments his misfortune.

His lament sets the stage for a series of dialogues between Job and his friends. They engage in a series of speeches, arguing that Job's suffering must be a punishment for some hidden sin. Job maintains his innocence and argues that his suffering is unjust.

At the end of the book God finally answers Job out of a whirlwind. Rather than providing a direct explanation for Job's suffering, God highlights the vastness and complexity of creation, emphasizing his own omnipotence and the limitations of human understanding. Through a series of rhetorical questions, God makes it clear that his ways and purposes are beyond human comprehension.

The Book of Job is a powerful exploration of the human condition, the mystery of suffering, and the nature of faith in the face of inexplicable adversity. It challenges simplistic notions of divine justice and encourages a humble acknowledgment of the limits of human understanding.



Dear Friends in Christ,

St. Ignatius of Loyola was a proponent of spiritual reflection and review. In his Spiritual Exercises (published in 1548), Ignatius teaches the Prayer of the Examen. He encourages the supplicant to reflect back on a day, a week, or a season, and prayerfully consider areas of consolation and desolation.

Consolation includes times when you were drawn toward God's active presence in the world. Times when the Fruit of the Spirit was evident (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness...). Times when you were growing in love, mercy, and hope.

Ignatius also encourages us, not to avoid, but to also consider areas of desolation. Times when you were


drawn away from God's active presence in the world. Times of resentment, ingratitude, jealousy, enmity, and strife. Times of turning in on self. Times of leaning away from community.

In my Evening Prayer, there is a short form of Ignatius' Prayer of the Examen that is called an Examination of Conscience. It is very simple exercise, but I commend it to you for your evening devotion. Give it a try for the next 2 weeks and let me know how it goes.

Briefly consider your day. What did I do well? What could I have done better? Whom did I offend? Whom did I help or encourage? Offer a simple Prayer of Confession Pray the Lord's Prayer Then, Rest Well

"Rest" is defined by Merriam Webster as "to cease work in order to relax." This does not align with my DNA, as I descended from a line of lifelong Lutherans who valued and instilled the virtue of work. My profession as a Corporate Attorney, coupled with the calling to serve God with all my abilities, meant I was always working. As my parents often reminded me, God-given talents were not to be squandered. This entailed dedicating over 60 hours weekly to legal affairs, alongside a comparable commitment to my church, nonprofits, and charitable endeavors. Carving out time for rest, even briefly, was always a challenge.

My rest lay in seizing solitary moments, cherishing quiet spaces, and delighting in the wonders of creation. Engaging in baking, artistic pursuits, and gardening brought me joy—solitary activities that yield delicious treats, handcrafted presents, and beautiful flowers to share with others. Even after my stroke when these activities became challenging, these joys still bring rest to my soul. I find myself drawn to times alone, when I hear God's call to rest my mind and soul, and experience His peace.

While it may sound incongruous for some people, preparing for the upcoming women's Bible Study retreat I lead is rest for my soul. Seeking the right Bible verses to encourage others, teaching others to find joy in their Bible reading and strengthening their faith is calming and restful to me. Rest comes in many forms, and creativity is mine."
