Our church council devotions this year are focusing on the petitions of the Lord's Prayer. A couple of months ago we discussed, "Forgive us our sins (trespasses) (debts) as we forgive those who sin (trespass) against (are indebted to) us." Anticipating the question, "What's the difference between sins, trespasses, and debts?", I prepared the following word study.

The New Testament uses five different words for sin...

- 1. hamartia -The most common word for sin, was originally a word used in archery meaning 'to miss the target'. Failing to hit the mark is hamarita. Therefore, one sense of sin is the failure to be what we might have been, could have been, and what God hopes we can be. Jesus desires for us to love one another and be one as he and the Father are one (John 17). When we don't do that, we miss the mark. Failure to love one another means we haven't hit the target. That is hamarita.
- 2. parabasis –Literally means 'stepping across', an offense, the New Testament usually translates this word as "transgression". This understanding of sin is the stepping across the line drawn between right and wrong. Crossing the boundary between honesty and dishonesty; lie and truth, etc. When someone's patience has been tested one too many times, they may use the phrase "You've crossed the line" or "You've gone too far". That is parabasis.
- 3. paraptoma This is more of a stumble or blunder, a misdeed. This is the word used in Matthew 6:14, "For if you forgive others their trespasses (paraptoma), your heavenly Father will also forgive you." Literally means 'slipping across'. It's the kind of slipping that might happen on an icy road. It is not as deliberate as parabasis. This sinning happens when we let our guard down, become overrun with emotions, or let go of our self-control. One Lexicon defines it as "a deviation from truth and uprightness."
- 4. anomia –Means 'lawlessness'. Anomia is the sin of a person who knows the difference between right and wrong and chooses to do wrong. Matthew 13:41, "The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin (all things that offend skandalon) and all evildoers (those who do iniquity anomia)."
- 5. opheilema –Means 'debt'; a failure to pay that which is due, a failure in duty. This is not just monetary debt, but related to Jewish Law. The ancient Roman world was an honor-shame culture; this refers to the ongoing attribution or loss of esteem by one's peers, family, social class, city, and so on. In Roman society, this respect was based primarily on such things as wealth, education, rhetorical skill, family pedigree, and political connections. Not upholding your end of the deal or doing something to cause someone shame or not giving someone the honor they are due would incur debt. This would be opheilema.

In the New Testament, Matthew (6:12) uses the word opheilema in his version of the Lord's Prayer. "And forgive us our debts (opheilema), as we also have forgiven our debtors (opheiletes). Luke 11:4 uses two different words, "And forgive us our sins (hamarita), for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted (opheilema) to us.

So which word do we use? William Barclay writes, "From a purely linguistic point of view, in the text of the Lord's Prayer in this petition (Matthew) "debts" is a correct rendering, "trespasses" is not justifiable, and it may be that "sins" would give the meaning most simply, most unmistakably, and not inaccurately" (Commentary on Matthew)

But also consider, Jesus probably spoke in Aramaic. So, he likely talked about disobedience toward God using the word choba'. Matthew, being characteristically Jewish, translated choba' using the legalistic sense of the word debt. Luke, being Greek, used a more general Greek word for sin.








#### **2024 Holy Land Tour Opportunities**





# PATRIOTIC PARFAIT


On the 4th of July, make this healthy, festive dessert to share with family and friends.

# Northwestern Ohio Synod

Dear Friends in Christ,



And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord."



Luke 1:41b-45

"Who is your Elizabeth?" When I wrote that question, I didn't know I would be sitting in a room in Dodoma, Tanzania with women leaders from across the dioceses. The question was part of Northwestern Ohio Synod's "Year of Story" Bible Study. It came from a reflection on Mary and Elizabeth, the two women who held the sacred space that gave Mary the courage to sing the Magnificat.

In this sacred space the question was translated to Swahili, as women leaders from Northwestern Ohio and Dodoma, Tanzania gathered to encourage and support each other. I told the story of my grandmother; of how she had been an Elizabeth to me, the space where my own story could be discovered and voiced. Then I asked, "Who is your Elizabeth?"

There was a pregnant silence in the room. I wondered if vulnerability could bridge the gap between us. It felt like we held that silence for a long time. Then Pastor Edda Swilla Mbwambo, a leader among the Tanzanian women, began to speak. She told the story of her mother. How she had formed her into a woman who could accept the call to serve as a minister in the church, and with that offering, call story after call story came pouring out. Each woman's testimony seemed to embolden the next. Their stories were filled with the names of women: women who had encouraged them, women who had blessed them, women who had made space for them to discover their gifts. Some of the "Elizabeths" named sat in the room among us.

I will never be able to fully explain what happened in that sacred space. Each woman told her story in Swahili, but somehow we understood what she was saying before the words ever made their way to English. The presence of the Holy Spirit was so thick that you could feel it. The translator couldn't keep pace with the movement of the Holy Spirit. It was the closest thing to Pentecost that I have ever experienced.

These women recognized the story of Mary and Elizabeth for what it is, a call story. They responded by giving their guests a gift. They shared their call stories. It was worth traveling all the way to Tanzania just to sit in that room with those women.

We forget sometimes that this bible story is the call of both Elizabeth and Mary. Elizabeth is called by the Holy Spirit to be the sacred space for Mary to sing. Mary is called by the Holy Spirit to sing of the transformative power of the coming of Christ.

On that day, we had embodied both of their vocations. We had been Elizabeths, holding the sacred space that emboldens others to sing. We had also been Marys, courageously singing of what God has done in our lives. I believe this is the dual call of every Christian. We are the holy space where others can sing. We are the ones who tell the story of what God has done for us.

I suspect that the Holy Spirit longs to fill rooms with this kind of testimony all over the world. I pray these questions stay with you. Who is your Elizabeth? Who holds the sacred space that emboldens you to sing? What song do you have to offer about the amazing things God has done for you?
