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Ask the Pastor

"We went to a different church when we were in Florida and one of the scripture readings was from the book of Sirach. What is that? Why have I never heard of that before?

Sirach is part of what is called the <u>Apocrypha</u>; a group of 14 books often placed between the Old and New Testaments in some bibles (physically and likely by date of authorship as well). Sometimes known as "intertestamental books", these books were not part of the Hebrew scripture so there is some debate about whether they should be included and what role they should play. For Lutherans, they are considered 'extra' books that are not necessarily part of the accepted canon of Scripture. That is to say, they are interesting and perhaps helpful, but they are not authoritative for all Christians. I don't know if it is theologically correct or not, but I once heard someone call the Apocrypha "biblical fan fiction" and that made me chuckle.

So why did they read it? Lutherans, along with the vast majority of mainline Protestant churches in the US and Canada use a scripture reading calendar called the <u>Revised Common Lectionary</u>; RCL. The RCL is a three-year cycle (labeled years A, B, and C) of three lessons that are prescribed for worship each week. During most of the year, there is a reading each week from the Hebrew Bible, a Psalm, a reading from the Epistles, and a Gospel reading. The RCL sometimes gives the option of selecting a reading from the Apocrypha. However, because some of the churches who use the RCL don't use the Apocrypha, it is always listed as an option.

For example, February 16 of this year, according to the RCL was the Sixth Sunday after Epiphany, in Year A. The lessons from the Hebrew Bible were Deuteronomy 30:15-20 <u>or</u> Sirach 15:15-20. In Williston, we read from Deuteronomy. The Lutheran church recognizes the Apocrypha (not as authoritative but helpful), but I generally choose not to use it. This is more because of personal preference than being a theological statement. The church you visited in Florida did chose the Apocrypha reading. Maybe it was a personal preference for them too, or perhaps that passage fit better with the pastor's sermon than the Deuteronomy reading did. There is no right or wrong choice, they are just different options within the Revised Common Lectionary.

If you would like to submit a question for "Ask the Pastor", Biblical, theological, church related, anything you have been dying to ask a pastor, you can hand me a note, ask me after church, send an e-mail, or sneak into the church after dark and anonymously slide a sealed envelope under my office door. If I answer your question in print, I will not include your name unless you explicitly ask me to.

Corinth was a large, bustling city (located in southern Greece). Because of its location, goods and people from around the world flowed in and out of its ports. It was a center for art, philosophy and religion. It contained a number of pagan temples including large ones to Apollo and Aphrodite. The city had a reputation for vide, immorality and debauchery. Paul spent 18 months establishing a church in Corinth during his second missionary journey (described in Acts 18).

1 Corinthians (which may actually be the second letter Paul wrote to the Corinthians; the first was lost) was written around 54 AD. It was in response to reports Paul received concerning problems in the church, disputed matters, and competing factions. (The letter written *to* Paul has not survived.)

Overall, the letter calls this fractious congregation to unity, Paul reminds them their actions should be informed by love (chapters 8 and 13), and closes with an appeal to let this love be the governing power in the life of the community.

2 Corinthians is perhaps the most difficult to interpret of all Paul's letters. Scholars think it is a combination of several fragments of different letters. This makes it seem disjointed in places. It is certainly a mixed letter, containing different styles and various elements; appeals, exhortations, rebukes, threats, attacks, counterattacks, self-defense, self-praise, and irony.



Week of November 2

1 Corinthians 9

Paul has the right to be supported by those he ministers to: an ox treading the grain must not be muzzled (Deuteronomy 25:4). Thus supported, he can preach the gospel without charge. Paul is flexible in his ministry – all things to all people. Paul compares himself to an athlete who competes for an imperishable crown.

Week of November 9

1 Corinthians 10

Israel was blessed, yet God scattered them in the wilderness. The rock they drank of was Christ. All things are lawful, but not necessarily helpful. Do not ask any questions about meat offered you at market, or an unbeliever's house, but avoid it if you are told it has been offered to idols. Do not seek to give offence to Jews or Greeks, but do all for the glory of God.

Week of November 16

1 Corinthians 11

Men praying or prophesying should have their heads uncovered; women's heads should be covered. Men and women are interdependent. The Lord's Supper should be eaten together, not with some starting their meal before others. Paul reminds them of the commemorative purpose of the Lord's Supper – inappropriate behavior makes one guilty of the body and blood of the Lord. Wait before you start eating!

Week of November 23

1 Corinthians 12

Those who have spiritual gifts glorify Jesus. Gifts are diverse, but the Spirit behind them is the same. Gifts may include wisdom, knowledge, faith, miracles, prophecy, discerning of spirits, speaking in tongues, and interpreting tongues. Diverse members make up the single body of the church – no member is separate, any more than a body part can be separate.

Week of November 30

1 Corinthians 13

Without love, all spiritual gifts are meaningless. Love is not envious, proud, arrogant, rude, cliquish, easily provoked, suspicious, nor happy with evil. Unlike spiritual gifts, love can never fail. Spiritual gifts are appropriate for the present time, but not forever – they belong to a spiritual childhood, and to seeing through a glass darkly. In time, however, we will put away childish things and know as we are known. Of faith, hope and love, love is the greatest.

Christmas Eve Service

At the October meeting, the Church Council made the very difficult decision to not have in-person worship on Christmas Eve. As you can imagine, this was a heart-wrenching decision. Nobody *wants* to do this. Christmas Eve worship in the sanctuary is a cherished tradition for many people here at St. John. However, the church council also recognizes that in this time of COVID, not gathering is the most responsible, loving way to keep all members and their families safe.

The primary concern is how we would accommodate everyone we anticipate would want to come. We have been doing very well with wearing masks and physical distancing at our weekend worship, but we tend to have a much larger crowd and more visitors on Christmas Eve. It is not unusual to have 280 to 320 worshipers at the 4:00 service alone. Granted, many will stay home this year because of the virus, but we have been seeing approximately 50% of our pre-COVID attendance on the weekend. That could mean 140 to 160 plus worshipers when we can only seat 75-80 in our physically-distanced sanctuary. With anticipated larger crowds, more visitors than usual, and folks coming from out of town or even out of state, we would need to be especially cautious in how we were seating people. We don't want to be the church that gave everyone coronavirus for Christmas. The church council discussed several alternative options such as adding additional services, seating people in other places around the building, pre-selling tickets, limiting the number of people who could come, and a host of other ideas. But we kept concluding that we would have to turn people away at the door for the safety of the worshipers already inside. At the meeting, someone joked, "We need to hire a bouncer!" That was in jest, of course, but there is a kernel of truth in that.

I was talking to a couple who volunteered to be greeters when their congregation returned to in-person worship for the first time. There were only a limited number of seats available in the sanctuary, so worshipers were supposed to go online and reserve their seats. But some people didn't *know* they were supposed to reserve a seat, others *thought* they had reserved a seat but didn't, one couple didn't think they should *have* to reserve a seat because there was plenty of room inside anyway, so what's the big deal? The couple who volunteered to be "greeters" ended up being more like "bouncers". They had to turn people away and were yelled at for trying to enforce the rules. The couple shared at a different service there was almost a fist-fight over attending church.

While we certainly don't believe anything like that would happen at St. John, the church council would never want to put anyone in the situation of being a "bouncer" on Christmas Eve. That is not loving and kind for the volunteer who has to be the 'enforcer' nor is it loving and kind for the worshipers who got dressed up and brought their family to church only to be told, "Sorry, we're full". So while nobody wants to *not* gather on Christmas Eve, the church council recognizes that in this time of COVID, not gathering is the most responsible, loving option for everyone.

Many thanks to the Worship Life Committee and the Church Council who faithfully wrestled with this very difficult decision.

However, this doesn't mean St. John won't worship on Christmas Eve. The Worship Life Committee is working on putting together a special Christmas Eve worship service that will be premiered/streamed on the evening of the 24th. We will also look into ways to make this available to our homebound members beforehand.

The synod has also been discussing some additional Advent/Christmas ideas that congregations can do virtually or distanced. We will be taking a look at those when they become available. While we will certainly grieve the loss of a beloved tradition this year, perhaps this will be an opportunity to create a new tradition, find a new way to celebrate the Good News of Jesus coming into the world.
