Ask the Pastor

Why do some people write "Xmas" instead of "Christmas"? Are they intentionally trying to take Christ out of Christmas?

- 2 You are not alone in your question. A poll on the website bible.com asked their readers: "What concerns you the most about how the world is attacking Christmas, a Christian holi-
- 3 day?" The most popular response was... "Using an "X" to replace Christ's name in Christmas - i.e. Xmas." The objection to Xmas is usually along the line that people have taken
- Christ out of Christmas and replaced him with an unknown, since the Greek letter chi
- (pronounced kai), which looks like the English letter x, is the symbol for an unknown quan-5 tity in mathematics.
- 6 But truthfully, this is more of a misunderstanding than part of an effort to subvert Christiani-
- ty. In Greek, the word "Christ" (CRISTOS) begins with the letter chi, which again, looks 7 like the English letter X. Xmas is simply an abbreviation; one that has been around for a
- long time. 8

- Some say using the single letter *X* for Christ dates to the first century AD along with other Christian symbols, but the evidence is lacking. Others believe that it came into widespread use by the thirteenth century along with many other abbreviations and symbols for Christian-
- 10 ity and various Christian ideas that were popular in the Middle Ages. However, scholars don't know for sure.
- We do know that in the fifteenth century Xmas emerged as a widely used abbreviation for 12 Christmas. In 1436 Johannes Gutenberg invented the printing press with moveable type. In
- the early days of printing, typesetting was done by hand and was very tedious and expensive. 13 As a result, abbreviations were common. In religious publications, the church began to use
- the abbreviation C, or simply X, for the word "Christ" to cut down on the cost of books and 14 pamphlets. From there, the abbreviation moved into general use in newspapers and other
- 15 publications, and "Xmas" became an accepted way of printing "Christmas" (along with the
- abbreviations Xian and Xianity). Even Webster's dictionary acknowledges that the abbrevia-16 tion Xmas was in common use by the middle of the sixteenth century.
- 17 So, while it's possible some people use "Xmas" as a way to avoid writing "Christ." And
- there are secular and commercial reasons that "XMAS" appears in ads and on signs; because 18 it can be larger and more attention-getting in the same amount of space (more bang for the
- 19 buck). Those factors do not take away from the thoroughly Christian origin of the word
- "Xmas." In this instance, concerns about taking Christ out of Christmas by writing "Xmas" 20
- instead of spelling out "Christmas" are misdirected.
 - If you would like to submit a question for "Ask the Pastor", Biblical, theological, church-





Communion Helpers Needed

There will be a communion training before the service this Saturday, December 3 at 4:00pm and on Sunday, December 4 following the service. Please join us!

(We would also like to populate a list of volunteers to create a rotation, so please let me know if you are willing to be added as a volunteer by call the church office or speaking with Pastor.)

The person who sets up communion and the server <u>can</u> be the same person, but that is not required. When volunteering (or being added to the rotation) please indicate if you are willing to help with one job or the other, or both.

Communion Set-Up


The Communion Set-Up person will need to arrive 10-15 minutes prior to worship and stay late for clean-up. The setup job includes filling the flagon and chalice (pitcher and cup) with wine; adding wafers, a host wafter, and 6-8 pre-sealed communion cups to the paten (plate); and placing the elements on the altar. The volunteer will also need to place a tray of empty Communion cups on the front pew on each side; also cover the bottom of the baskets for empty cups with a napkin and place them at the opposite end of the front pews. Clean-up includes returning the communion items to the sacristy (room adjacent to the altar area) to be cleaned and put away. Used cups will need to be thrown away and baskets returned to the sacristy. This is not a difficult job, but it does take some time to prepare the altar or worship. Many have found this simple act of service to be joy and a boost to their spirit as they help their church family prepare for worship.

A guided walkthrough of the process and a more detailed list of instructions can be made available.

Communion Server

The Communion server will assist the pastor by pouring the wine from the chalice into the individual communion cups as worshipers come forward to receive Communion. The server will also help the pastor in recognizing anyone who is not able to come to the front of the sanctuary for Communion. This is not a difficult job and being the means by which someone receives the blood of Christ is a wonderful way to feed your soul.

Gracious Lord,






Jesus, Gentle Shepherd This cane of red and white Proclaims the sweet love story, Bom on Christmas night.

And so this cane reminds us Of just how much You care, And like Your Christmas gift to us, It's meant for all to share.



Dear Friends in Christ.

"Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you" (Matthew 7:7).

Jesus asks a lot of questions. I once read that Jesus asks over 300 questions. Often Jesus answers a question with a question. What's up with that? Why so many questions, Jesus? Is it because questions help us to pause and to ponder? Is it because questions help us dig just a bit deeper? Is it because questions have a way of leading us to a new place in a new way?

Late last week, I was looking for a blessing to offer at a prayer retreat. I didn't find the blessing I was looking for, but I did find a series of questions by Father John O'Donohue. He calls his questions, A *Mirror of Questions*, to be asked in prayer at the end of the day. These are rich questions to pray and to ponder. Give these questions a try this week and see where your soul may be stirred and strengthened.

What dreams did I create last night?

Where did my eyes linger today?

Where was I blind?

Where was I hurt without anyone noticing?

What did I learn today?

What did I read?

What new thoughts visited me?

What differences did I notice in those closest to me?

Whom did I neglect?

Where did I neglect myself?

What did I begin today that might endure?

How were my conversations?

What did I do today for the poor and the excluded?

Did I remember the dead today?

When could I have exposed myself to the risk of something different?

Where did I allow myself to receive love?

With whom today did I feel most myself?

What reached me today? How did it imprint?

Who saw me today?

What visitations had I from the past and from the future?

What did I avoid today?

From the evidence – why was I given this day?
