### Ask the Pastor

#### "What does incarnation mean?"

Incarnation literally means "to take on flesh". For Christians it's a way to talk about the mystery of God becoming fully human while remaining fully divine.

But if we take it a step deeper, incarnation means Christmas is about far more than a baby in a manger wrapped in cloth.

It's about God showing up - literally - in the flesh - right here with us. God comes close enough to touch. Close enough to see.

Close enough to hear the beating of a human heart. God's grace stops being an idea floating somewhere out there and becomes something embodied, something alive. That's the beauty of the Incarnation: God choosing to live our life with us, in our world, in our skin.

Yes, we can catch glimpses of grace in nature - a blazing sunset, a bird's song, a mountaintop view. Those moments feel holy, but they come and go. At Christmas, grace doesn't just pass by. Grace puts on flesh and stays. By stepping into our humanity, God makes it unmistakably clear that our lives, our messy, complicated, joyful, and real lives, truly matter. The Incarnation is God's way of saying, "I'm here. I'm not going anywhere. I am with you always." And here's something we don't always say out loud... when God becomes human, it blows up the idea that life is only about getting to heaven someday. In Jesus, God blesses this very life, this very moment. Eternal life doesn't wait until the end - it begins now. Heaven isn't just a future promise; it's something woven into today. Ever since God appeared in flesh, the divine and human have been forever intertwined. It's mysterious, yes. Hard to explain, absolutely. Needs a great deal of faith to understand, undeniably. But when we gather for worship, our goal isn't to figure out the mechanics.

Our call is to live as if it's true - because it is.

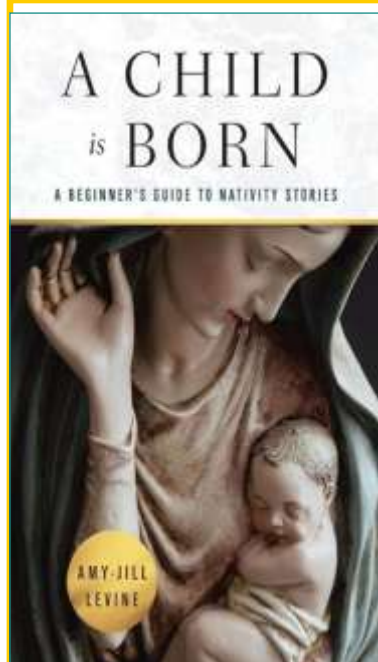

## ***How many of you are familiar with an Advent Calendar?***

*The idea dates back to the German Lutherans in the 1800s. It is based on the tradition of writing chalk tally marks on walls or lighting candles to count the remaining days until Christmas. Modern Advent calendars help you count down the days by either moving a little star on a calendar or opening up a little pocket or box to reveal a tiny gift (or moving Hans Gruber down the Nakatomi Plaza). Since they were very little, we have gotten chocolate Advent calendars for our kids. (Actually, that's something we still do.) Each day they can open the numbered window and count down the days until Christmas with a piece of chocolate. One year we even found an Advent calendar filled with dog treats. I doubt Fancy understood the sentiment, but she was glad to have a daily treat.*

*This year, I would like you to consider participating in a twist on that idea... a Reverse Advent Calendar. Instead of taking something out for yourself, the idea is to put something in or set something aside to give to someone else— thus giving instead of getting. There are boxes and calendars listing different items for each day until Christmas available at the church. Or you can print a calendar from the newsletter or Facebook and use your own box from home. At the end of Advent, the reverse calendar will result in a collection of 24 items that can be dropped off at the church to support a good cause at Christmas time.*

*The calendar we have created supports the needs pantry at the **Advent Lutheran Center and the LIGHT Neighborhood Pantry at Elliston Zion**.*

*The **Advent Lutheran Center** is one of five day programs operated by Luther Home of Mercy. Here, individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities socialize with others, interact with the community and learn new skills. When this site opened several years ago, there was a strong desire by participants to give back to their community through volunteering. However, they discovered many places are not willing or able to accommodate persons with disabilities as volunteers and the offer to help was frequently declined.*

*That did not deter the Advent participants... instead, they opened their own personal needs pantry. (They believe this to be a first-of-its-kind program in Ohio and a true celebration of the positive community spirit of those they serve.) This project is largely funded by the individuals themselves, their families, and the staff who work there. They are not always able to keep up with the community demand for products. Our help enables the participants to keep the pantry open and keep offering smiles and needed items to others.*

*The **Light Neighborhood Pantry at Elliston Zion** is open to all residents of Ottawa County struggling with food insecurity. They are a free local choice food pantry where clients can select the items they want and will use. The pantry can get many food items from the Toledo NWO Food Bank, but hygiene and personal need items are rarely available. Our help enables them to provide these items for the people they serve. On average, the LIGHT Neighborhood Pantry serves 35-50 families each month and serves dinner once a month to as many as 85—90 people. The LIGHT Neighborhood Pantry is open on the 2nd Weds. of each month from 5-7 PM and is also available in emergency circumstances. They also have a partnership with the Blessing Box here at St. John to share items they have in abundance with our community.*

*Our Reverse Advent Calendars will support both organizations when they are filled. Also this year our Thanksgiving offering will be designated to support our neighbors as they meet these community needs. You will hear more about these ministries in the season of Advent.*

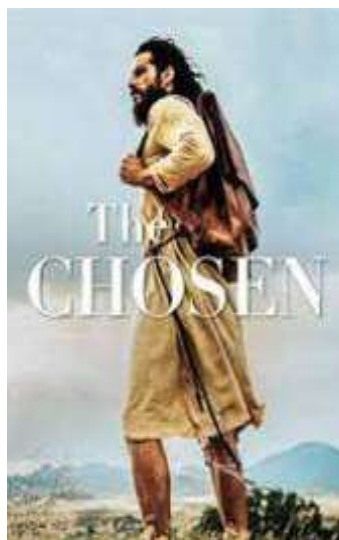

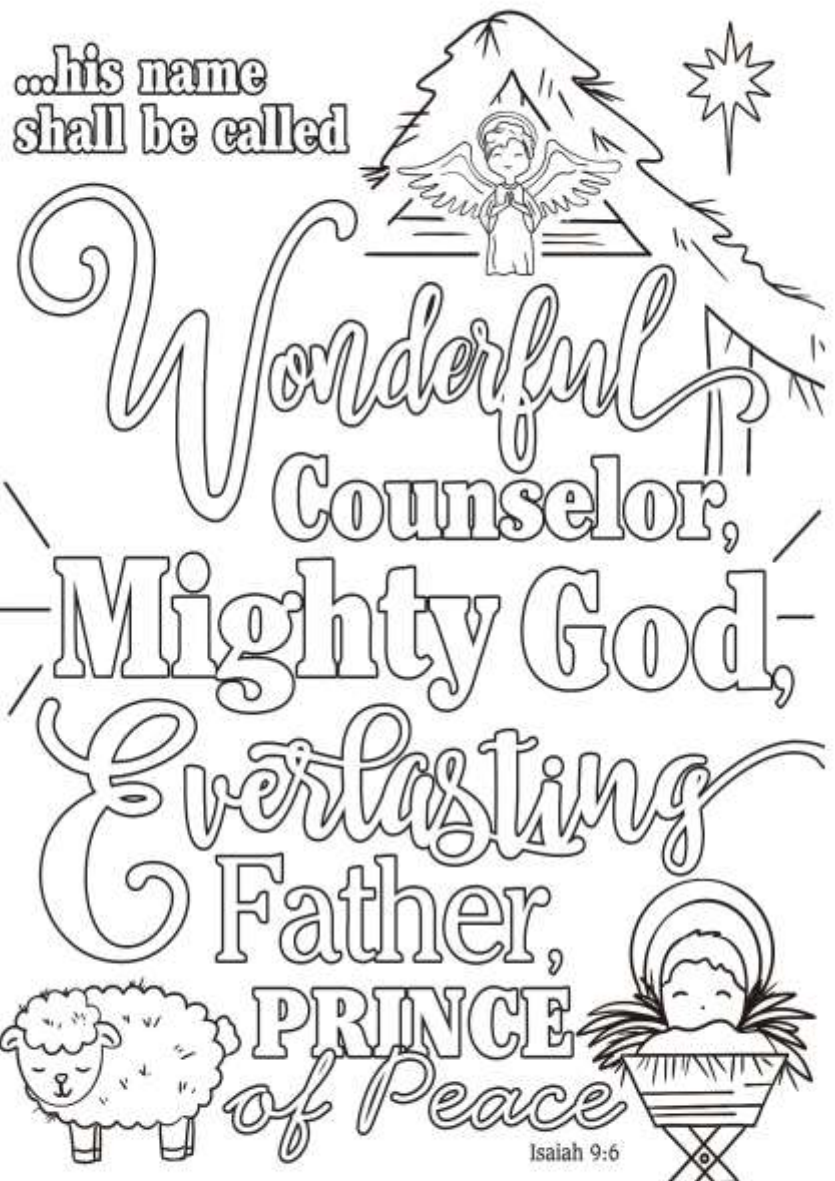

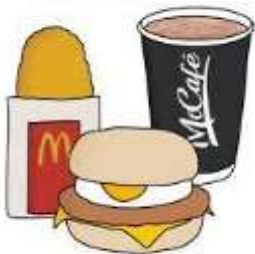


### **The "Blanket Ladies" gather to make quilts on Tuesday mornings at 9:00 am.**

# December Stewardship



## *Seven Ways to Embrace Generosity this Christmas!*

**Christmas is a season of joy, reflection, and hope—a time to celebrate the gift of Jesus and the love He came to share.**

**It's also an opportunity to practice generosity, responding to His example by caring for those around us. Here are seven simple yet meaningful ways to make generosity a part of your Christmas this year:**

### **1. Give the gift of time**

Christmas can be an isolating season for those who live alone. A simple visit, heartfelt phone call, or an afternoon spent over tea can make a world of difference. By giving your time, you remind others they are seen and loved—a powerful reflection of God's enduring presence.

**Idea:** Consider making this a regular habit, perhaps starting a friendship with someone who may need regular companionship.

### **2. Bless a ministry or charity**

Many Christian organizations rely on donations to continue their work spreading the gospel, feeding the hungry, or supporting those in crisis. A financial gift during Christmas can help them finish the year strong and prepare for the ministry opportunities ahead.

**Prayer prompt:** Before giving, pray for the organization and the people they serve, asking God to multiply the impact of your gift.

Invite a neighbor, an international student, or someone from your church who might otherwise spend the day alone. Sharing food is a timeless expression of love and fellowship, mirroring Jesus' ministry on earth.

**Inspiration:** Consider turning your invitation into a tradition that includes others every year.

### **4. Support a local Food Pantry**

For many, Christmas can be a season of struggle rather than celebration. By donating non-perishable goods or volunteering at your nearest food pantry, you can help ensure that no one in your community goes hungry. Remember, your kindness reflects God's care for the most vulnerable among us.

**Tip:** Encourage your church small group or family to join

you. A collective effort can make an even greater impact!

### **5. Pray for others**

Prayer is a profound act of generosity, lifting others before God in faith and love. Set aside time during Advent to intercede for your community, missionaries, and those facing hardship. Praying as a family can also help children understand the power of seeking God's help for others.

**Activity:** Create a prayer jar filled with the names of people or causes to pray for during each week of December.

Choose items that champion justice, compassion, and sustainability—fair trade products, handmade goods, or charitable gifts that empower communities. These thoughtful choices can also be a conversation starter, sharing the message of God's love with the recipient.

**Shop ethically:** Many Christian organizations and small businesses sell gifts with a purpose—look for options that align with your values.

### **7. Show everyday kindness**

## December 2025 Las Posadas | Luke 2: 1-7

Week 1

*“In the name of heaven, I beg you for lodging.”*

Many of us “are preparing” by buying Christmas decorations, planning dinner menu, buying gifts. As you take a moment to think about how you prepare, consider this verse: Joseph and Mary have no place to stay during this season. Think about what is happening in the world, think about the homeless, think about the migrants who, for one reason or another, have had to leave their cities and are begging for shelter. Where do you see hope? Write a prayer for the vulnerable.

Week 2

*“This isn’t an inn, go on ahead, I can’t open, lest some scoundrels be here.”*

It’s very common for us to tend to classify or stigmatize people. We hear the narrative that “migrants are \_\_\_\_\_.” Write down the narrative you have about migrants. Jesus invites us to offer help, to offer our arms, our words. What can you do? How can you build peace?

Week 3

*“I don’t care about the name, just let me sleep, for I tell you now, we will not open it.”*

List all the things that are worrying you right now. Now write three things that have made you laugh this week. Write the name of one person you are grateful to have in your life. Turn your worries into prayer. Where do you see joy in your life? When we feel grateful to God, we let go of our grumpy side and are more open to empathizing with those who are suffering. Are you familiar with AMMPARO? It’s the ELCA’s strategy to accompany migrants with protection, advocacy, representation, and opportunities; this is a chance to learn more and share your joy.

Week 4

*“Enter, holy pilgrims, receive this humble dwelling, for though it is poor, I give it to you from my heart!”*

Christmas is not just a date on the calendar; it’s a celebration of God’s tangible love, who takes on the most fragile human form: a vulnerable baby. This demonstrates that when you love, you make yourself vulnerable. God isn’t looking for a “perfect place.” He’s looking for a heart willing to love. What does love mean to you? How do you show it to your family? How do you show it to your friends? How do you show it to strangers and foreigners?

### “The Posadas”

The posadas are celebrated daily for the nine days leading up to Christmas, from December 16th to 24th. Their origin dates back to 1587. The litany for asking for lodging is meant to remind people of the long pilgrimage—from Nazareth to Bethlehem—of the Virgin Mary and Joseph to register for one of the provincial censuses ordered by Emperor Caesar Augustus (63 BC–14 AD), which coincided with the birth of Jesus.

### The biblical text that inspired it is Luke 2:1-7

*“In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. <sup>2</sup> (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) <sup>3</sup> And everyone went to their own town to register.*

*<sup>4</sup> So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. <sup>5</sup> He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. <sup>6</sup> While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, <sup>7</sup> and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no guest room available for them.”*

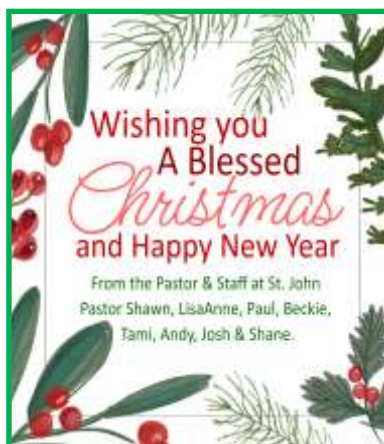
