Ask the Pastor "Do Lutherans believe in Predestination?"

The short answer is "no". The longer answers is "well, sort of... but not in the way most people use the term, so still "no".

First an explanation... Predestination is the idea that everything – all events past, present, and future, are willed by God. Whatever happens, happens because God is following a script written long ago. This believe is most commonly used to explain who is going to heaven and who is going to hell and how that decision has already been determined by God (sometimes called "double predestination"). The implication would be that it doesn't matter what you do, God has already decided if you are in or if you are out. As you can imagine, this idea brings up a host of issues. I won't list them all, but one of the big issues with Predestination is the roll of individual "free will" in contrast to God's omniscience (knowing everything there is to know) and divine will. How do those two ideas work together?

Now the short answer... No; Lutherans do not believe that certain people are predetermined to salvation or damnation. We are not saved or condemned because, for whatever reason, God made that choice before we were born.

As to the more nebulous response; Lutherans believe we have free will in matters of this life (what to have for breakfast, who to marry, whether to love your neighbor or TP their house, etc.), but we do not have free will in the matters of the life to come. That is, we can't choose to go to heaven like we would choose to go to the grocery store. Our place in God's kingdom is predestined in that Christ suffered, died, and rose for us while we were still sinners so that we might have life. A place in the resurrection has been predetermined for those who seek God (thus the' sort of' answer), but it is based on the grace of God and the work of Christ, not a traditional understanding of the Doctrine of Predestination where God has a mysterious system of picking winners and losers (thus the 'still no' answer).

So, when we read passages like Romans 8:28-30, we understand Paul was speaking to those who wanted to exclude some from the Christian community (likely for not following the covenant completely). Paul was not trying to say who was in and who was out, what is predestined is what will happen to all who are in Christ. They will eventually be conformed to the image of Jesus Christ and glorified. So perhaps a good Lutheran response would be that God predestines the consequence of the choice to be in Christ or not, but God doesn't predestine the choice itself. "While we were still sinners Christ died

for us" (Romans 5:8), that act of salvation was predestined. God wants everyone to put their trust in Jesus, and through the Spirit God empowers us toward this end. But we also know that some people refuse to participate in that relationship.






USHERS NEEDED





Dear Friends in Christ,

I am recently returned from an extended Sabbath. I am grateful to the Synod Council and the Synod Staff for the gift of a summer sabbatical. It was a sacred time of rest, release, and reset. The word sabbatical comes from the word Sabbath, and Sabbath is a sacred time for rest and release.

My time away had a 4-Fold Purpose:

- 1. Rest, renewal, and retreat (Tend to Body, Mind, and Soul)
- 2. Increase my Fundraising Capacity through a Lily School of Philanthropy Course of Study
- 3. Trace the geographic sojourn of my French-Canadian ancestors in Quebec and Northern Michigan
- 4. Reconnect with God's creation as a thru-hiker

Much of my time was spent in monasteries and monastic communities in Kentucky, Quebec, and Indiana. They were all quite different. My Sabbatical started with a silent retreat at the Abbey of Gethsemani in rural Kentucky. These are the Trappist monks. Thomas Merton was a member of this community from 1941 to 1968. The Trappists observe silence throughout the day. The only time they speak is during the seven daily prayer services. Vigils at 3:15 a.m., Lauds at 5:45 a.m., Terce at 7:30 a.m., Sext at 12:15 p.m., None at 2:15p.m., Vespers at 5:30 p.m., and Compline at 7:30 p.m. Yes, I went to them all. I ate very simple meals. I hiked in the hills in the late afternoon. I watched the sun rise and set. The days of silence were jarring, but good for my soul. I needed that sacred silence and prayerful rhythm. It was a true change of pace. No cell phone. No email. No deadlines. No rush.

While in Quebec City I stayed with the Augustinian sisters. Six nuns in their 70's and 80's, who treated me like a dear member of the family. We prayed morning prayer and ate breakfast together. In the afternoon, I was able to hike and explore. In the evening we prayed Vespers. The sisters spoke no English, and they were very patient with my French. My original cell (room) was ancient and small. I had to duck to get in through the door. A bed. A wardrobe. A desk. A window. A crucifix.

In northern Quebec, I was 2 hours south of the wildfires. In the middle of the day, it was dusk. The smell of smoke was strong. My clothing smelled like a campfire. Fr. Gariepy from St. Irenaeus was my guide for the week. In the early mornings we engaged in prayer and spiritual direction. In the afternoons and evenings, I was off exploring. I was able to pray in the church where four generations of my ancestors were baptized, married, and buried. I was able to stand on the ground where my great-great-greats cleared the land and plowed the earth. I was able to car camp along the St. Lawrence River at the exact place where my first ancestors landed in New France in 1656.

My sabbatical ended in southern Indiana with the Benedictines at St. Meinrad Archabbey. They were the opposite of the Trappists. Really rich food. Beautiful prayer services with powerful voices. Lots of laughter. All of these monastic moments helped me to connect with God in a new way and strengthened my faith. There is something inspirational about being around godly people who dedicate the full of their days to loving and worshiping God. And even though I'm not Roman Catholic these communities of faith welcomed me with open hearts and open arms.

My prayer is that we might build our communities into sacred places of welcome, love, and openness. Places where people can find God's gift of rest and release.

Financial Secretary, Treasurer and Finance Committee Report: Dan Kessler, Jennifer Nelson & Kristina Wildman

Expenses: We are 91% of the monthly budget and 97% of the year to date budget. Income: We are 89% of our monthly budget and 92% of our year to date budget. Income over expenses: On a year to date basis, we are currently negative \$16,462 compared to our budget of negative \$8,260. Semi-Annual Letter going out. We charter the Boy Scout troop and they provided us a copy of their financials. Our current 3 year investments with Mission Investment Fund (MIF) for the activity center fund and endowment fund are coming due in November. We have an option to invest with Genoa Financial (investment arm of Genoa Bank). Jordan Moore, financial consultant with Genoa Financial, presented the finance board with options. Rates look to be much more attractive and can be FDIC insured. Also, given our committee changes each year, keeping up with signers can be much easier as we can make changes at the same time we make changes with Genoa Bank. Finance board is looking to move forward with this option once the current CD investments mature.

Christian Community Life: Susie Mathews August Food Pantry, 35 families were served and 6 new wagons were purchased. 80 backpacks were donated and we were able to fill all of them with school supplies that were also donated. The backpacks were given to Genoa Schools and Bright Side (a Head Start program in East Toledo). On Sept 10 we served a luncheon for God's work. We served at the Food Pantry the 13th packaging the food, we had 13 volunteers. And on the 16th we distributed the food. We had 11 volunteers plus the scouts and a few seniors from Genoa school.

Evangelism: Melissa Hayes

We put together the Halloween basket we are donating for the trunk or treat. We also discussed the Community Christmas tree lighting which will be on December 2, after the service. We will be taking donations for Nightingales Harvest. We also discussed our menu for the event and trying to get a donation for the food. Welcome pamphlet being developed for new visitors.


