Several years ago, The Saturday Evening Post ran a cartoon showing a man about to be rescued after he had spent a long time ship-wrecked on a tiny deserted island. The sailor in charge of the rescue team stepped onto the beach and handed the man a stack of newspapers.

"Compliments of the Captain," the sailor said. "He would like you to glance at the headlines to see if you'd still like to be rescued!"

SCHOLARSHIPS Available

Scholarships for continuing education are available from St. John Lutheran Church. Applications may be picked up from • the church office and are also available on the church's website. **The application deadline for all scholarships is April 30**, **2021.** You may return the completed forms to the church office any time before that date. **If you have any questions, please** • **contact a member of the scholarship committee: Pastor O'Brien, Carol Jensen, Deanna Neuman, and Al Brown.**

Below is a brief summary of the scholarships available. The scholarship committee recommends that anyone that has graduated high school within the last five years take a close look at • the application requirements. All eligible students are encouraged to apply.

TANK SCHOLARSHIP

- This scholarship was established in 1997 and is provided through the generosity of Carol Tank and the late Robert Tank.
- In order to be eligible for this scholarship, the applicant must be an active voting member of St. John Lutheran Church for at least three years before the start of the col lege semester that the applicant is applying for this scholarship.
- The applicant must attend a four year accredited college or university.
- The scholarship is a one year scholarship for \$500 that can
 be applied for by the applicant for their first or second year.
- A second scholarship is available for those attending Capi- tal University.

ST. JOHN SCHOLARSHIP (Lutheran Partners)

- The purpose of this scholarship fund is to aid in the education of our students who will be attending an ELCA related college.
- The applicant must be a voting member of St. John Lutheran Church.
- The grant will be \$500 for each qualified student contingent upon the dollars available in the scholarship fund.

YOUNKER SCHOLARSHIP

- This scholarship began in 2006 and is made available by an annual contribution from the Younker Scholarship Fund and is solely dependent on that annual contribution for the scholarship program to continue.
- The student must be a confirmed church member who is actively involved in the life of the Church and who demonstrates their faith.
- Recipient will be a recent high school graduate. Recent defined as within five years of the date of the beginning of the school year.
- The student will attend either a public or private accredited college or university and be degree seeking.

EARL JOHNSON MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

- This scholarship was established in January 2016 from a portion of Earl's estate bequeathed to St. John Lutheran Church.
- The applicant must be a confirmed St. John member and active in the life of the church during their high school years.
- Scholarship value will be up to \$1,000 and determined by the applicant's church worship attendance as well as church and community activities.
- The applicant must attend either a public or private accredited college or university and be degree seeking.
- Applicants must me a recent high school graduate. Recent shall be defined as within five years of the date of the beginning of the school year.
- Recipients can apply more than once, but can only receive the scholarship once.
- Scholarship recipient and value will be determined by the St. John scholarship committee.


PHYLLIS PARKS ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP

The Book of Psalms, which is generally believed to be the most widely read of all the books in the Old Testament, is part hymnbook, part prayer book, part wisdom literature, and part anthology of poems that express the religious feelings of the Israelites throughout the various periods of their national history. The subject matter of the Psalms is astonishingly broad. On one hand it proclaims praise and prayer for God Most High (Psalm 50:14), and on the other, it embraces human experience as intimate as lamenting a lost mother (Psalm 35:14). The Book of Psalms has a special significance for understanding the religious life of ancient Israel. The prophets and scribes provide some insight concerning what the Hebrews thought, but the psalms give the clearest indication of what the Hebrews felt. Here, we find a revelation of the hopes, the joys, the sorrows, the loyalties, the doubts, and the aspirations of the human heart.


The Psalms are of varying length (but most are pretty short) and there are a lot of them, however, we will continue with our 'one chapter per week' reading plan. Over the course of the next few years (150 Psalms!) we will discuss the different types of Psalms (lament, praise, worship, royal, etc.) and the different uses for Psalms. One suggestion is praying through the Psalms. Augustine of Hippo said, "If the psalm prays, you pray. If the psalm laments, you lament. If the psalm exalts, you rejoice. If it hopes, you hope. If it fears, you fear. Everything written here is a mirror for us." As you pray the Psalms, you will learn how to pray in every season, whether rejoicing with those who rejoice or mourning with those who mourn.

ELCA Conference of Bishops holds spring meeting

The Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) held its online meeting March 4-5. The conference, an advisory body of the ELCA, comprises 65 synod bishops, the presiding bishop and the secretary.

"While the technology allows us to meet, much of what we do when we are together is build relationships with each other between sessions," said the Rev. Tracie Bartholomew, bishop of the ELCA New Jersey Synod and chair of the conference. "To that end, we are eager to meet in person and hope to do so in October. We accomplished the business of the conference, as well as spent time talking about and moving into the future."

"We bid farewell to Pastor Walter May, executive for Synod Relations, as he retires later in March, and we welcomed Deacon Mary Ann Schwabe into that role," Bartholomew said, adding that the conference expresses heartfelt thanks for May's 13 years working with the bishops.

In her report to the conference, ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth A. Eaton said, "We've learned over the past year how resilient we are as church and as people of God. Last year was a year of pain, loss, injustice and uncertainty. It was also a year of learning, listening and trying new things — stepping out of our comfort zones and into a more virtual world. This church persevered in so many ways."

During the meeting, the conference reviewed an updated draft of "Definitions and Guidelines for Discipline" from the Committee on Appeals. The document describes the grounds by which officers, rostered ministers, candidates for rostered ministry, congregations and members of congregations may be subject to discipline according to the practice of this church. The document now goes to the Church Council for consideration during its spring meeting.

The conference also welcomed guest speaker Krish Vignarajah, CEO of Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS), who spoke of the long legacy shared by the ELCA and LIRS in welcoming and caring for new-comers.

A panel of pastor-theologians addressed the topic of the post-pandemic church, and this address was followed by small-group conversation. The panelists were the Rev. Peter Marty, pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church, Davenport, Iowa; Dr. Anthony Bateza, assistant professor of religion at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn.; and Mary Hinkle Shore, rector and dean of Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary of Lenoir-Rhyne University.

In other business, the conference:

- Received a report from Judith Roberts, ELCA senior director for Diversity, Equality and Inclusion, addressing synod diversity goals. Roberts spoke of the trend toward an increase in synods that have created anti-racism teams and diversity goals. Roberts also provided the conference with information on resources to help build intercultural competence.
- Received a report from John Weit, ELCA executive for Worship, addressing how worship has been adapted during the pandemic.
- Engaged in conversation about the conference's role in the ELCA's Future Church design.
- Received written reports from the secretary, treasurer and other churchwide home areas, and updates from the conference's various committees.
