Ask the Pastor

“I was having a conversation with a coworker about a topic and they told me I was wrong and the Bible verse they quoted was right, but it seems to go against a different Bible passage I was reading. Which one if us is right?”

(Note: question was edited to remove the topic to focus on the use of scripture.)

The problem with these sorts of conversations is that the Bible says a lot of different things. If you are in favor of slavery, you can find justification for it in the Bible; but if you are an abolitionist the Bible supports that too. If you believe women should be subservient to men, that’s in the Bible; but if you believe women should be empowered and equal, that’s biblical as well.

We run in to trouble when we try to read the Bible as if it were one single book (it’s not), written by one single author (it’s not), written in a single time and place (it wasn’t) and then we try to conclude that somehow all of these different biblical voices and settings and circumstances must be reconciled one single voice where every part “agrees” with every other part. The Bible just doesn’t work that way.

(Making everything “agree”, by the way, is called the “Flat Bible” approach and it’s lead to some unhealthy perceptions of God.) The truth is, when it comes to contemporary, watercooler type topics, there is almost nothing the Bible “clearly says”. Instead, the Bible represents a variety of views and perspectives about who God is and what God is like. Our challenge is to figure out which voices in the Bible we should agree with and which voices in the Bible we should be more skeptical about.

So how do we do that?

Lutherans tend to use a Christ-centric reading of the Bible. We believe Jesus is the best picture of who God is and what God is like, so we read and consider all the Bible (not just the New Testament) through the lens of Jesus. For example, Deuteronomy 6:5; “You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might.” Does that fit with what we know about Jesus? YES! Jesus actually quoted this verse when talking to the Pharisees. Passages about loving God are some of the ones we pay special attention to.

How about Leviticus 24:19-20; “Anyone who maims another shall suffer the same injury in return: fracture for fracture, eye for eye, tooth for tooth; the injury inflicted is the injury to be suffered.” Does that fit with what we know about Jesus? NO! Jesus says, you may have heard this... but God wants something different (see Matthew 5).

So, passages about revenge are ones we are skeptical about. Those are pretty basic examples of course, but I hope you get the idea.

One blogger shared some tips for reading and studying the Bible. Other than thinking his last step should be the first one, I liked his list so I’ll share it with you...

“First, we need to admit to ourselves that we bring our own biases and ideas to the Scriptures when we read them.

Second, we need to accept the fact that we might be wrong about some of our assumptions about the Scriptures and what they’re saying to us.

Third, we need to admit that we might have something to learn from others who look at things from another perspective.

Fourth, we need to understand that the best way for us to look at the scriptures is through the lens of Jesus since He is the best picture we have of who God really is.”

I especially liked the part about learning from each other. Wouldn’t our Bible discussions, and really *all* our conversations, be more productive if we start them assuming we have something to learn rather than thinking we need to prove a point that we already believe and can perhaps hammer home with a few Bible verses? Proof texting all the latest issues is a misuse of the Bible and a horrible way to share our faith.





How Long, O LORD?

A Stephen Ministry Devotion on Psalm 13

Life has been difficult these past few years. You may be like me, wondering, “How long is this going to go on?”

David asks the same kind of question in Psalm 13: “How long, O LORD? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? How long must I wrestle with my thoughts and every day have sorrow in my heart?” (Psalm 13:1–2a). David’s difficulties at the time must have been going on for a while; you can hear his deep struggle each time he asks, “*How long?*”

But even though David clearly doesn’t feel it in that moment, he knows deep down that God is with him. A little later he says, “But I trust in your unfailing love; my heart rejoices in your salvation” (verse 5). The phrase “unfailing love” comes from the Hebrew word *hesed*, which refers to God’s persistent, unconditional, tender love. Because of this love, David knows he can honestly express his deepest feelings, trusting that God will listen and care.

During these difficult times, I want to assure you that your prayers are heard because of God’s *hesed* for you, just as David’s were. When David rejoiced in God’s salvation, he knew of the promised Messiah, but he couldn’t yet see the full story of how Jesus would see our suffering, take on human flesh, bear our grief, and pave the way to eternal life and restoration. But we can see the full story. We can have hope in the midst of our pain because we know of Jesus’ sacrifice for us and the promise that one day there will be no disease, death, or evil. That promise encourages us as we face challenges in our lives, and it makes it possible to faithfully care for others, knowing Jesus is with us every step of the way.

We know these can be times of anxiety and uncertainty, loneliness and pain. Your St. John Stephen Ministers are here to help.



- Likely over budget for March with free shipping available for bulbs now.


Old Business:
