We have, of course, opened our sanctuary for worship again this month. We have had smaller than usual crowds, which is to be expected. We are taking recommended precautions; signing in, wearing masks, using less of the building, after worship cleaning, and respecting physical distance. All of that seems to be going well so far. Thank you for your cooperation during these less than normal times.

As you think about coming back to St. John for worship, I would like to encourage you to do what is best for you and your family. If you want to get out of the house and you're ready to be physically distanced in a small crowd, we would love to see you in worship. If you would feel more comfortable worshiping at home for a while longer, we will continue with our live and recorded on-line worship, and we'll be here when you are ready to join us.

The Worship Life Committee is checking with musicians and singers about returning to live music.

It might be a while before we can have choirs and song leaders like we use to, but we are hoping to re-add live music to our worship at the beginning of August. We are also discussing ways to celebrate Holy Communion that respect the significance of the meal yet allow us to maintain distance. When we resume, it will be different than it used to be and it might not be as frequent for a while either, but we are hoping to re-add this to worship at the beginning of August as well.

Thank you all very much for your patience. We will keep you updated.



God's work. Our hands.

Look for the scars By Brian Hiortdahl

Where is God in this crisis? Is this punishment? Why does God allow this to happen?

Seventy-five summers ago, locked in his prison cell, German theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer lamented: "They mock me, these lonely questions of mine." Such potent questions resist easy answers, so I distrust anyone who tries to give any. There is wiser company among those who ask them: Bonhoeffer, long-suffering Job, wailing Rachel, the psalmist, Christ on the cross: My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? (Mark 15:34).

Martin Luther wrote about his painful experience of "Deus Absconditus," the hidden God whose absence he sometimes felt acutely. God's presence and purpose are often shrouded in impenetrable mystery. Indeed, it's our certainty that gets us into theological trouble. If we are certain that God is all good and powerful, what can we credibly say when tragedy strikes? This conundrum is so common it has a name: theodicy. No human mind has satisfactorily resolved it.

Even if we had an airtight answer, would that comfort a grieving family or help a heroic front-line health care worker?

But theodicy does serve us well by exposing the limitations of our assumptions about God. Like anyone, God has the right to defy our definitions. God won't be a tidy, consistent micromanager of cosmic happiness just because we expect it (or dream of being that ourselves). Nor is God a punitive judge, though that can be a seductive line of thought. Paul explained to the Romans that the punishment for sin is enduring its natural consequences, not serving some divine sentence. Reality isn't as clear-cut as we might wish. God is wiser, more powerful and more loving than we are, but that can be awfully difficult for us to trust when God seems hidden and terrible head-lines are so visible.

Where, then, should we look for God? Luther points us to the cross. In the weak, suffering, dying Jesus, we see the heart of God most clearly.

God is with us

On her deathbed as a young adult, Julian of Norwich saw a vision of Jesus in agony on the cross and was overwhelmed with joy. She grasped as never before the depth of God's love

for her in its profound solidarity with her suffering—or it grasped her. God enters, shares and transforms our questions and death rather than magically removing them.

Perhaps this is why, in the Gospel we read each Sunday after Easter, the disciples don't realize Jesus is speaking to them until they see and touch his wounded hands and side. Transformed by resurrection, Jesus remains hidden until they recognize the evidence of his suffering. Their reports are empty words for Thomas until he, too, sees the scars. Only then does he know who this is: "My Lord and my God!" (John 20:19-29).

Where is God in this crisis? Look for the scars. God stands in line for a ventilator, struggling to breathe. God works behind a makeshift face mask, exposed to death while fighting to save a life. God waits at home from a painful distance, caring for restless children and lifting heavy questions to a silent sky. God takes abuse while restocking toilet paper for less than a living wage. God walks alone, delivering critical supplies. God sleeps on the street, sheltered in place beneath a bridge until the cops come and once again "the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head" (Luke 9:58). Immanuel. God is with us.


Paul has something to add, reminding the church: "Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it" (1 Corinthians 12:27). Now we are the ones sent, broken, scarred and risen to bring hope to the world.

In 251, a plague ravaged northern Africa. "The question for [Bishop] Cyprian was not why the plague had broken out but how Christians should respond to it," wrote Alan Kreider in *The Patient Ferment of the Church* (Baker Academic, 2016). Cyprian's answer was to imitate God by patiently showing mercy to everyone, even nonbelievers. The world learns who God is by watching us.

Our scars might not be physical. They might be punctures in the heart from an eloquent silence shared with someone who has just buried a beloved they can no longer see, a "life hidden with Christ in God" (Colossians 3:3). They might be the wounds of lonely questions and unanswered prayers. They might be open gashes of exhaustion. Love reaches in multiple directions and cuts in different ways.

Where is God in this crisis? Where do you see love? Look for the scars.

The glorious man says he has faced opposition from the prince of the kingdom of Persia, and was helped by the prince Michael.

Week of July 27

Daniel 11

Three kings shall arise in Persia. The fourth shall be richer than them all, and fight against Greece. A mighty king's empire will be divided into four parts at his death. The southern part shall become the strongest.

Week of August 3

Daniel 12

Michael shall stand up at a time of trouble. The Jewish people shall be delivered, if their name is found written in the book. The dead will be resurrected, some to everlasting life, some to everlasting contempt. The righteous and wise shall shine like the stars. Daniel is told to shut up his words, and seal the book until the end of time.

Secretary Minutes for May were approved with one change

Pastor's Report:

least through the end of June. We will re-assess need at the end of month and make a decision for July. To date we have distributed 432 bags of food

Mini Food Pantry: Our Mini-Food Pantry has been completed. Thank you to Richard Phillips who did an amazing job. It looks great. Diane G, Alice, Carol, Marilyn and Carolyn from the team that will keep it cleaned and stocked. Right now, we are using some of the food we have ordered for food bags. When that project is discontinued, they will be requesting items for our mini pantry.

Newsletter: I am not sure who makes this determination, but LisaAnne has asked if we should continue to distribute the newsletters the way we have been or if we should return to pre-COVID mailings.

Before the pandemic we printed and mailed about 300 of newsletters. The bulk mailing cost is about \$50, plus our \$240 annual fee (which we probably have to keep for giving statements). Now, she prints far fewer. She mails about 40 (\$22) to homebound/out of area people, but most read them online or pick up a copy at the church. We have a much lower postage cost and use much less paper. Do we resume mailing newsletters to everybody? Council agreed to print and mail newsletters to those who request mailings. Please contact the NEW BUSINESS: No meetings in July. We will meet in person church if you would like a newsletter mailed to you.

Financial Report: reported that as a whole the Boards of Ministry are under budget. Many of the Boards are at zero. Property has completed the work on the outside of the building and a TV and cables were purchased for the digital ministry.

Also reported that the income is slightly below budget but

above last years giving. The Finance committee will be looking into ways to finance a new computer, camera and supplies for worship. Cost is around \$2,400. There is currently a lap top fund for Andy Kessler. Please keep this in mind with your giving.

Christian Community Life reported The Food Pantry helped 63 people in May and 30 Families. It is currently our turn to help at The Food Pantry. We have enough help and it will be a drive through pick up.

The Bauman car raffle will continue until September 6. The church office will be selling a limited amount of tickets in person. Cost of ticket is \$5.00. Tickets can also be obtained through Cindy Hartman and Becky Tank. You can mail your money to Cindy Hartman, PO Box 33, Williston, OH 43468 or Becky Tank, 17381 W/ Hausencomb, Graytown, OH 43432 and they will mail you the ticket to you.

Supplemental Food Bags: We continue our food distribution at Parish Education: First extended an enthusiastic THANK YOU to our Sunday School teachers for the past year, which was interrupted by Covid 19. Also, a big thank you to Stefanie and Deanna Neuman for putting together a take home VBS packet based on prayer, something everyone needs more at this time. We are beginning to think about Sunday School this fall, and what it may look like.

> Worship Life: Timeline for re-introducing live music will be at the beginning of August. Possibilities for how to partake in communion while staying within safety guidelines are currently under consideration. We will continue our live stream of the service indefinitely. We want to continue this after the pandemic is no longer a concern. Because of this, we are recommending that Andy Kessler be hired on as our videographer. We recommend that he train interested people so that they will be able to sub for him when he cannot be there. Attendance at the services for the two weeks we have been back in the sanctuary has been sparse, but appears to be slowly growing.

Property: reported that Radiant Windows has completed the work on the outside of the church building. Also, a urinal has been repaired.
